Dallas County Criminal Justice Advisory Board General Membership Minutes for Monday, June 14, 2021 Via Microsoft TEAMS

Welcome & Introductions, Commissioner Dr. Garcia, called the meeting to order at 2:30 PM. All in attendance recorded via Microsoft TEAMS.

Membership & Infrastructure:

Introduction of Dallas Police Chief Eddie Garcia to CJAB & Vision for DPD – Ms. Lindberg introduced Chief Garcia and read his bio. Chief Garcia introduced himself to the CJAB Board, and gave his vision for the Dallas Police Department. Details of Chief Garcia's vision can be found on the Dallas Police website.

Selection of Law Enforcement Subcommittee Chair Chief Bryan Sylvester – Ms. Lindberg introduced Chief Sylvester and read his bio. There was a motion and a second to elect Chief Sylvester as the CJAB LEA subcommittee chair. The motion passed unanimously.

Meeting Minutes:

The minutes from the CJAB General Membership meeting held on March 15, 2021, were made a part of the packet. There was a motion made to accept the minutes as printed.

Presentations:

New Directions for Public Safety and Positive Community Change – Dr. Timothy Bray

Commissioner Garcia introduced the presenter Dr. Timothy Bray and read a short bio.

Dr. Bray began the presentation by giving a brief background on his work with Dallas County Administration in Criminal Justice reform. Dr. Bray stated policing now a day has become more complicated. Police officers are expected are now expected to be peacemakers, first responders, protectors, negotiators, fast thinkers and counselors. The research that they are do and the questions they are trying to answer are what can we do differently. How can we eliminate time-

draining activities? How can we get the right resources to the right tasks? How can we improve safety?

Dr. Bray stated that their role in the process is going to be to collect data and assess current call volumes and patterns. Evaluate planning for the deflection program, and evaluate of pilot program impacts and effects of the program that Dallas County has funded through grants. The goal is here is not to simply say did this initiative work, but to take the bigger picture and say how are these investments changing the quality of life in Dallas County, not just for our citizen, but for our police officers who are working.

Dr. Bray mentioned that so far, there are six agencies who participated in the initial phase of the project. The data collected from the agencies are as follows: Incident data for community interactions, details regarding the incident data, rank the top 5 quality of life calls, identify other data sources for police/community interaction and what calls could be handled differently. Some of the common quality of life calls that police officers responded were noise complaints, parking violations, mental health evaluation/wellness checks, criminal trespass, motor vehicle assistance and request for information. They will need help from Dallas County law enforcement agencies in two areas. First, how do we share data to increase officer and citizen safety and lastly how do we expand our analysis to include more agencies.

Dr. Bray stated that they would like to create some database in which LEAs are able to share data, and be able to see medical/mental health information of their arrestees. Ms. Lindberg mentioned that Judge Creuzot is interested in this sort of database, and asked Dr. Bray to look into DCIM database.

Dr. Bray stated that he would like more LEA participation in their current initiative. He will be sending an email to Mr. Canales with his contact information to send to all Dallas County LEAs with and explanation to the current initiative.

Committee Project Updates:

Criminal Justice Administration & Jail Population Management Update:

LaShonda Jefferson gave the update. The Jail Population committee meeting was held on Friday, June 11th. Excerpts from that packet can be found on pages 17 through 22 of the CJAB packet. The jail population for today is 5,521. The May 2021 average jail population was 5,400 and the yearly average is 5,580.

Fair Defense Committee:

Lynn Richardson gave the update. The courts are now beginning to open up for jury trials and hearings. There is concern about the backlog of cases, Ms. Richardson is working with Public Defenders across the Country to determine how to effectively deal with this backlog of cases.

Justice of the Peace:

Judge Steve Seider gave the update. The legislative session H.B. 3774 would amend the code of criminal procedure, and this would required all pleas in JP courts to be done in person with the judge making a specific finds that would verify the mental health status of defendant. Judge Seider reported jury trials are starting up and they are preparing for them. His JP court is currently under construction. The only other issue, is concern with cyber security. They receive many exhibits that are emailed to them, and Judge Seider has concerns that those exhibits could be compromised.

Law Enforcement/Jurisprudence:

Ellyce Lindberg gave the update. There was no meeting scheduled this past quarter. The last subcommittee meeting we held on Monday, March 16th. The minutes of the meeting are part of the packet. This meeting was held to inform LEAs of electronic disposition reporting (EDR) requirements and solicit help from Dallas County LEAs.

Pretrial:

Jeff Segura gave the update. Pretrial Services continues to do well. The ELM and Alcohol numbers are up. They have had to allocate other officers to ELM to help with reducing officer caseloads. Right now, they are exploring a structural change in ELM cause of this new reality with high caseloads. Pretrial Services has asked for two new technicians from the Budget Department. The yearly Pretrial report will be completed within the next two weeks, and will be made available.

Reentry:

Christina Crain gave the update. Ms. Crain reported they are gearing up for 2021 Texas Re-entry Symposium. The Symposium will be September 14th and will be virtual. Flyers will be sent out to CJAB committee once available containing enrollment information. Unlocking DOORS is currently creating employment council, which will allow employers who are background friendly to work hand in hand with Unlocking DOORS and its clients.

Research:

Dr. Jennifer Gonzalez gave the update. The results from AIM study are now available. They expect to have that for the group within the next few weeks. The results will be sent to the DA's office. Dr. Gonzalez will share the results during the next committee meeting.

Program Update:

Local Data Advisory Board:

LaFayne McCall gave the update. We are close to closing the gap to get to 90%. The deadline is 8/1/21 to reach compliance, and we are very close. Looking towards next year compliance metric deadline of 8/1/22, we are currently at 79%. In order to reach this metric we would need to close out 30,000 cases.

Julie M. Turnbull

Julie Turnbull is the Chief of the Restorative Justice Division for the Dallas County District Attorney's Office. She oversees the Pre-Trial Diversion Programs and Specialty Courts for Dallas County as well as the Mental Health Division. Julie grew up in Dallas and attended The Hockaday School. She graduated from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas with a B.A. in English and then received her law degree from St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas. She served as an assistant district attorney for Dallas County from 1994-1998 practicing in both felony and misdemeanor courts as well as the Public Integrity Division. Since 1998 she has served as the sole prosecutor for the Dallas County DIVERT Court. In 2009 she also became the prosecutor for the 4-C SAFPF ReEntry Court until 2016. She has presented on drug court topics at national, state and local conferences. She is a member of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, the National Association of Drug Court Professionals, and the Texas Association of Specialty Courts (TASC) where she is a past president. She is also a board member for the Community Corrections Improvement Foundation.

Laura Edmonds Bio:

Laura Edmonds is the Assistant Director of the Dallas County Criminal Justice Department, where she manages staff and oversees the work the department does related to behavioral health jail diversion initiatives and programs. This involves oversight of the Criminal Justice Department's works to ensure all Dallas County Jail inmates with a suspected or confirmed mental health diagnosis are identified, assessed, and have coordinated care to community-based services when released. Laura also oversees work related to Dallas County's competency coordination the Frequent Utilizer System Enhancement (FUSE) project which targets individuals who are homeless and connected to the criminal justice system. She regularly engages criminal justice system stakeholders to evaluate the behavioral healthcare and criminal justice system to address policy compliance and process improvement.

Prior to joining Dallas County and the Criminal Justice Department in 2016, Laura worked for three years providing direct clinical services and clinical management at a local mental health and substance use provider in Dallas. In her role as Clinical Manager, she supervised therapeutic staff, developed policies and procedures, oversaw quality management and program evaluation, and facilitated regular staff training. She was a court liaison and key coordinator of treatment services for specialty court defendants. Laura continues to provide direct clinical care by maintaining a private practice caseload.

Laura is a Licensed Professional Counselor and a Licensed Chemical Dependency Counselor. She has a M.A. in Counseling from Dallas Theological Seminary and a B.A. in Family Ministries from Moody Bible Institute. She is also a 2020 graduate of the Dallas County Leadership and Management Academy where she engaged in an intensive 9-month course to gain increased management and leadership skills.

Crystal Garland's Brief Bio:

Crystal Garland is the Program Manager for the Opioid Response Grant within the Criminal Justice Department. This program is in the developmental stages and she is responsible for strategic planning, program implementation and developing community partnerships with agencies providing Medication Assisted Treatment services as well as substance use treatment. This program is also responsible for collaborating with the Dallas County Sheriff's Department and Parkland Jail Health in the Lew Sterrett Justice Center to identify individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD).

She currently manages two licensed assessors who are responsible for conducting clinical assessments on those referrals from Parkland Jail Health who are currently in custody or out on bond. These potential referrals have been identified as having an opioid use disorder as well as individuals who may be eligible for pre-trial diversionary programs.

Prior to starting her career at Dallas County in 2021, Crystal began her career in the mental health field as a Qualified Mental Health Professional over 18 years ago. She was one of the first jail diversion case managers in the Jail diversion court programs through LifeNet Community Behavioral Healthcare. After thirteen years with LifeNet, the clinic merged with Metrocare Services where she fulfilled the role as the TCOOMMI Jail Diversion Manger prior to being promoted to the TCOOMMI Program Director.

Crystal holds a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Belhaven University in Jackson, Mississippi and a Master of Science in Forensic Psychology from Grand Canyon University in Phoenix, Arizona. She also holds an Associate License in Chemical Dependency Counseling.

Identify offenders at jail book-in with opioid use disorder, assess their needs, link and refer to Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) services within the community.

Pre-Trial Diversion Programs (PTD)


Identify first time offenders who may be eligible for court-based diversionary programs to potentially resolve criminal charges as well as link and refer to community resources. This program addresses the defendant's behavioral health needs upon release.

OPIOID RESPONSE



According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), the purpose of an opioid grant:

"address the opioid crisis by increasing access to treatment, reducing unmet treatment needs, and reducing opioid overdose related deaths through the provision of prevention, treatment and recovery activities for opioid use disorder."

STATEMENT OF THE PROBLEM

According to Parkland, from August 2018 through July 2019, Parkland medical staff at the jail treated <u>7,136 unique individuals</u> for detox from heroin or opioids

Yet one of the largest provider of MAT services in Dallas County, treated only **639** individuals in 2019 – of those *only 15% were forensically involved*.

(These numbers point to a huge disconnect between persons who may be eligible for MAT services and those receiving MAT services)

WHAT IS MAT?

- Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) involves the use of medications in combination with treatment, to address opioid use disorder.
- MAT is designed to normalize the brain chemistry to block the euphoric effects of alcohol and opioids, help to relieve physiological cravings, and normalize body functions without the negative and euphoric effects of the substance used.
- Helps relieve the withdrawal symptoms and psychological cravings

Referral

- 1) Parkland Jail
- 2) Defense Attorney
- 3) ADA

All referrals screened through the Criminal Justice Dept. CJD will contact the defense attorney to schedule the assessment.

Goal – complete assessment within 20 days of arrest.

CJD will inform the defense attorney ONLY of the recommendation

GOAL: To identify treatment needs

The assessment of the defendant will identify what substance use treatment and medicated assisted treatment (MAT) will be most beneficial to him/her

GOAL: To link to community services

- Coordinate with attorney on recommendation
- Coordinate with Jail to ensure continuity of care
- Facilitate warm handoff to treatment
- Dispense NARCAN upon release

NALOXONE (NARCAN)

<u>Why</u>

- Persons with opioid use disorder are overrepresented in the criminal justice system and face higher risks for opioid-related death.
- Within the first 2 weeks after release, the risk of death from drug overdose is <u>12.7 times higher</u> than the general population.

What

- NARCAN® Nasal Spray
- FDA approved for treatment of known or suspected opioid overdose. Designed for use in the community.
- Needle-free and ready to use.





PRE-TRIAL DIVERSION



Risk/Needs – if place offender in program that doesn't meet the assessment level you can actually do more harm.

Higher drop out and failure rate and may "Learn" criminal behavior

Persons who assess with **Low Risk** do not need a specialty court – so offering Pre-Trial Interventions

Currently there are few ways to get case dismissed or expunged without a Specialty Court – gives individuals a way to prevent a felony conviction

- **Standardized** across all pre-trial programs
 - Specialty Courts
 - Pre-Trial Interventions (formerly known as Conditional Dismissals)
 - Prostitution
- Identify cases early in process and hold from Grand Jury
- Standardize expunction language across all forms for all courts and programs.
- Process for Indigency application for Indigency

Process for Pre-Trial Diversion

Effective July 1, 2021

Recommendation for pre-trial diversion specialty court.

Recommendation for Pretrial Intervention Agreement (PTI)

(Formally known as conditional dismissals)

Referral to the DA's Mental Health Division to handle the case.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

First Time Felony Offender (no prior felony conviction, probation, deferred probation or expunction)

Non-Violent Offense

The following charges are ineligible for pre-trial diversion:



Detention Early Warning Report (DEWR)-Glossary

The DEWR is a 32 line item report which provides a snapshot of the Dallas County Jail Population, capturing the primary case status/category (also referred to as a "bucket"). The DEWR consists of pre-disposition Felony and Misdemeanor cases, and those adjudicated which are awaiting release or transfer.

1 Felony not filed:	Felony arrest made by local law enforcement agencies (LEA's), case has not been accepted by the District Attorney (DA).
2 Felony pending Grand Jury (GJ):	Felony cases accepted for prosecution and awaiting presentation to the GJ.
Felony not including State Jail	
3 Felonies (SJF):	Felony offenses excluding SJF which have been indicted by the GJ and are now pending in the felony courts.
4 SJF pending disposition:	SJF offenses which have been indicted by the GJ and are now pending in the felony courts.
5 Probation Violators (PV) Felony:	Defendants (Def's) in jail for various violations of the terms and conditions of their felony probation.
Texas Department of Criminal	
Justice (TDCJ) over 10 years on	Def's received a felony conviction and were sentenced to TDCJ >10 years; the case may or may not be on appeal. Def is not eligible for bond.
6 appeal or TDC no appeal-	bet 3 received a relong conviction and were sentenced to TDC >10 years, the case may not be on appear. Det is not engine for bond.
7 Bench Warrants:	Def's being held as a witness in another Def's case; will be transferred back to TDCJ once the case is resolved.
/ Belicii Warrants.	Del's being field as a withess in another Del's case, will be transferred back to TDCJ once the case is resolved.
8 TDCJ 10 years or less on appeal:	Def's received a felony conviction and were sentenced to TDCJ <10 years and are appealing their sentence; may be eligible to post bond.
9 Sentenced to SJF:	Def's received a felony conviction and were sentenced to a State Jail Facility, awaiting transfer.
10 SJF on appeal:	Def's received a felony conviction and were sentenced to a State Jail Facility and filed an appeal; may be eligible to post bond
11 SJF serving in county jail:	Def's received a felony conviction and were sentenced to time in the county jail.
12 Misdemeanor not filed:	Def's arrested for a misdemeanor offense by a local LEA; case has not been filed by the DA's office in the county courts.
13 Misdemeanor filed pending:	Def's charged with a misdemeanor offense and their cases have been filed with the county courts and are pending disposition
14 Misdemeanor PV:	Def's in jail for various violations of the terms and conditions of their county court probation.
Serving County Time as a	
15 Condition of Probation:	Def's held in county jail as a condition of probation (sanction). Not eligible for good time credit.
16 Serving County Time & Fines:	Def's sentenced to jail time and are serving their sentence.
Serving Fines and Court Cost	
17 only:	Def's serving time for fines and court cost only.
,	Def's being held for another county or jurisdiction. Upon completion of their Dallas County jail time, agencies typically have 10 days to pick up the defendant
18 Out of County/State Hold:	or they are released.
19 Parole Violations:	Def's in jail for various violations of the terms and conditions of their felony parole.
SAFPF (Substance Abuse Felony	
20 Punishment Facility):	Def's ordered to a substance abuse treatment facility as a condition of felony probation and are awaiting transfer to that facility.
21 Special Programs:	Def's being held for Wilmer Judicial Treatment Center, Electronic Leg Monitor (ELM), or other community treatment programs.
22 Other Incompetent:	Def's being held in county jail awaiting transfer to a State Mental Health Facility.
23 US Marshal:	Dallas County contracts as a US Marshal holding facility.
24 Contempt in Jail:	Def's in jail for contempt of court.
25 Contempt Furlough:	Def's temporarily released from the jail.
26 Peace Bond:	Court ordered cash bond designed to keep the peace and protect a person or property from a threat (rarely used).
27 Texas Youth Commission (TYC):	Def's being held for transfer to TYC; TYC is now Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD).
28 Immigration:	Def's detained by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) being held for transfer to a federal facility for immigration detainers.
29 Class C Misdemeanor only:	Citations which result in a fine, serving time in jail.
30 Contract Inmates:	Contract Holds for another County or Jurisdiction (overflow).
31 US Military:	Temporary hold for US Military.
32 Default:	Def's in transit: recently booked into jail (on the floor), have not been classified, and/or assigned to a jail/tank/housing unit

Dallas County Criminal Justice Advisory Board Pretrial Committee Minutes for Monday August 30, 2021

Committee Chair Commissioner Dr. Elba Garcia called the meeting to order at 2:03PM. The following committee members where present: Jeff Segura, Duane Steele, Ronica Watkins, Judge Steven Autry, Tomasa Ortiz, Brooks Love and Miriam Villarreal.

Pretrial Update:

A. Alcohol Monitoring Unit

Pretrial Services is attempting to work with the Courts and Sentinel to address indigent defendants needs for services. Pretrial has previously used the BART device (handheld alcohol Monitoring device) for defendants that could not pay for Intoxalock. Pretrial is looking for ways to make this a structured program. A request was sent to the Civil District Attorney requesting an opinion regarding indigence for alcohol monitoring equipment. Pretrial Services is working with Auditors Office to set up debit card payments for Alcohol Monitoring Fees. This would provide a more convenient method for defendants to pay fees and create less foot traffic in Frank Crowley Court House.

Mr. Steele further stated that the Civil DA has responded to the request of indigence for alcohol monitoring. It was stated that there is no mention on indigence in the statue. Having an indigent program would be the responsibility of the Department.

B. Electronic Monitoring

Pretrial Services has had abnormally high number of defendants placed in the electronic monitoring program. Modifications to the program are being introduced to mitigate the high number of cases.

C. Smart Justice

Pretrial Services is meeting with various stake holders to update the existing 16.22 Program through Pretrial's Smart Justice initiative. Pretrial Services currently reviews individuals who are booked into the jail that have been flagged with mental health issues to participate in the Smart Justice initiative.

D. Intake

Pretrial Services is meeting with IT to improve our processes of ensuring all individuals receiving a 15.17 magistration hearing have a financial questionnaire and risk assessment completed.

E. Department Overall

Pretrial Services is working to expand their internal training program. Pretrial services has requested an additional position to support our Training Manager in this initiative.

Pretrial Staffing Update:

A budget request has been put in for two electronic monitoring technicians and a trainer position. Dr. Watkins stated that she will have a summary list for Commissioners Court with all new positions. We would need to verify that these positions that Pretrial Services is requesting are ARP if eligible.
