#### DALLAS COUNTY, TEXAS Minutes of the Behavioral Health Leadership Team Meeting <u>Thursday, August 10, 2023</u> https://www.dallascounty.org/departments/criminal-justice/bhlt/

#### Welcome and Call to Order

Commissioner John Wiley Price called the Behavioral Health Leadership Team (BHLT) meeting to order at 9:30 AM. Commissioner Price welcomed everyone and announced that the meeting was being recorded and those who continued in attendance were consenting to being recorded as a part of the open records.

The Commissioners present were Commissioners John Wiley Price and Dr. Theresa Daniel. Commissioner Price entertained a motion for opening the meeting. A motion was made by Commissioner Dr. Theresa Daniel and seconded by another participant. The motion was unanimously passed by the committee members.

#### **Review/Approval of Minutes**

The minutes of the BHLT meeting held on Thursday June 08, 2023, were included in the meeting packet. Commissioner Price offered an opportunity for the minutes to be reviewed and approved. The minutes were approved as submitted.

#### **Introductions**

Commissioner Price welcomed everyone to the meeting and asked first-time attendees to introduce themselves: First time attendees were:

#### North Texas Behavioral Health Authority (NTBHA) Update

**Carol Lucky, Chief Executive Officer, NTBHA** provided the report. Carol reported that the Competency Program at Dallas Behavioral Hospital (DBH) is now operational. This program was created to assist in decreasing the current waitlist of individuals in jail waiting for admission to a state hospital for competency restoration. Dallas County allocated American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to NTBHA to purchase 14 beds at DBH for competency restoration. Carol also reported that HHSC may be allocating funding for 150 beds statewide, dedicated to the top 5 counties (Bexar, Tarrant, Travis, El Paso and Dallas County) that have the highest backlog of people waiting for competency beds, excluding Harris County. Dallas County may receive a potential 48 bed allocation at a maximum rate of \$800.00 per day. Carol reported she has also been in communication with HHSC to discuss the need for additional Private Psychiatric Beds (PPB)

along with local private hospitals to identify their charity needs. Carol briefly discussed RFP's going to LMHAs for coordinated services including; crisis residential based services for kids, early onset programs, crisis stability and diversion centers, state hospital step down programs, youth crisis outreach teams.

#### Meadows Mental Health Policy Institution (MMHPI)

No update provided this meeting

#### **Dallas County Behavioral Health Housing Workgroup (BHHWG)**

**Commissioner Dr. Theresa Daniel** provided the update. Dr. Daniel expressed concern for the economic reality post pandemic, housing needs and the overall cost of homelessness. Dr. Daniel briefly discussed situational variables that contribute to an increase of individuals experiencing instability and uncertainty in their personal housing needs.

#### **Dallas County Mental Health Advisory Committee Update**

**Yordanos Melake,** Program Manager, Criminal Justice Department reported that the 16.22 Mental Health Assessment Unit (MHAU) went live on July 17, 2023. Yordanos reported, from July 17<sup>th</sup> to July 31<sup>st</sup>, there were 1200 magistrate orders for screenings, with Adapt completing 772 and 38 individuals refusing screenings. Yordanos states, from August 1<sup>st</sup> to date the MHAU received 776 magistrate orders for screenings, with Adapt completing 420. Yordanos states, the greatest impact to completing assessments were wait times due to shift change, feedings times, and or staff stations being limited and not having the capacity to move individuals quickly for the interviews. Yordanos recognized Chief Debra Williams, over the Inmate Housing Bureau, who worked with the team to identify efficient solutions to decreasing the wait times to meeting with individuals in the jail.

#### Legislative Update

**Janie Metzinger**, Legislative Coordinator, NTBHA, provided the update. Janie provided a report to the committee on the 88<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature's regular session related to publicly funded behavioral health services. Janie reported that the total for 2024-2025 biennium in HB 1 was \$9,365,521,188. Janie briefly discussed HB 12 extension of Medicaid coverage for postpartum women for twelve months and SB 26 that amends several Texas statutes related to LBHA/LMHA audits and mental and behavioral health reporting, services and programs.

#### BHLT Voting Membership Review Committee Update

**Charlene Randolph,** Director, Criminal Justice Department, provided the update. Charlene stated that the committee met last Friday and are currently working on presenting the recommendations discussed in those meetings to the BHLT September 14th.

#### **Funding Opportunities Updates**

#### • Cottages Update

**Charlene Randolph,** Director, Criminal Justice Department, provided the update. Charlene referred to the Cottages report in the BHLT packet. For the month of July, the Cottages started with 44 clients and ended with 45. The report does not show any updates to their case management services, however, this will be updated next month.

#### • SAMHSA Residential Treatment Grant Update

**Marcus Turner**, SAMHSA Grant Coordinator, Criminal Justice Department, provided the update. Marcus reports that Nexus had no admissions for the month of June and July but one participant successfully discharged. Marcus states, at Homeward Bound, there was one admission for the month of June and two for the month of July, with three participants discharging successfully and a 64 day average wait time. Marcus also reports that the Criminal Justice Department is waiting on the approval from SAMHSA on continued grant funding.

#### • Community Courts Grant Update-Public Defender's Office (PD)

**Vickie Rice,** Public Defenders Office provided the update. Vickie referred to the BHLT packet for the statistics on the Problem-Solving Courts. Vickie reported that Dallas County represented at the National Association of Drug Court Profession (NADCP) and the courts have come back to reevaluate processes, numbers and overall impact. Vickie states the PDs office has hired a few individuals, including a social worker and currently looking to fill the position of their Engagement Supervisor.

#### • Restorative Justice Division-District Attorney's Office (RJD)

**Julie Turnbull,** Chief, Restorative Justice Division, District Attorney's Office, provided the update. Julie referred to statistics within in the BHLT packet. Julie reported that the DA's office was able to send 15 prosecutors to the NADCP conference and engage in team building activities across the department. Julie reports that they have reached capacity in a few of their programs including drug court, as they have had to reject 52 individuals over the past two months but expect successful graduates this month which will allow them to accept more participants. Julie states that the DA's office has been a part of conversations with the Opioid Task Force Committee and look forward to the strategic plan being provided to Commissioner's Court. Julie reported the DA's office went to the Tarrant County Mental Health Diversion Center for a visit and expect continued collaboration to improve and expand the Dallas County Deflection Center. Julie and Doug Denton (Homeward Bound) report the Deflection Center has now been open one year. Doug states that they've received about 266 individuals to the center and plan to continue engagement with law enforcement agencies.

#### **Upcoming Events and Notifications**

- Landy Blackmore, Hickory Trial Hospital, invited the committee to a free screening of a new documentary, *Tipping the Pain Scale*. The screening will be held at the Texas Theater in Waxahachie on August 24<sup>th</sup> from 1-4pm.
- Joe Powell, CEO, APAA, announced that September is Recovery Month and the Big Texas Rally for Recovery will host "Recovery Reunion Under the Sun" on September 9<sup>th</sup> 11a-3pm. A flyer with more information will be sent to the committee.
- Judge La'Donna Harlan, STAC Court, invited the committee to the STAC Court graduation in the Central Jury Room, next Friday, August 18<sup>th</sup> at 1pm.

Commissioner Price thanked everyone for their service. The meeting was adjourned at 10:40 a.m.

**Mission Statement:** The Dallas County Behavioral Health Housing Work Group (DCBHWG), with diverse representation, will formulate recommendations on the creation of housing and housing related support services designed to safely divert members of special populations in crisis away from frequent utilization of expensive and sometimes unnecessary inpatient stays, emergency department visits and incarceration.

Success will be measured in placement of consumers in housing and the decreased utilization of higher levels of care (hospitals and emergency care visits) and reduced incarceration in the Dallas County Jail. The DCBHWG is committed to a data driven decision-making process with a focus on data supported outcomes.

#### Dr. Daniel opened the meeting and attendees introduced themselves.

**CALL TO ORDER**: The minutes were approved with amended changes from Jim Mattingly. In the Mattingly Report, he added "delinquent rents" to the first sentence. He substituted the word "mobilize" for "stabilize at" to the seventh sentence. In the eighth sentence he added the words "owners of" and changed the word "the" to "higher" in the same sentence.

#### GOVERNANCE

#### Dallas Area Partnership to End and Prevent Homelessness:

The Partnership meeting was held on August 3<sup>rd</sup> and there was a brief discussion about the City of Dallas HOPE (Homelessness, Organizations, Policies, and Encampments) Task force report. City of Dallas councilmember Cara Mendelsohn made a presentation on the founding documents of the partnership for discussion of the bylaws and articles of incorporation. The documents will be reviewed before the next meeting to discuss and recommend possible changes.

#### Dallas County Homeless Advisory Committee:

Homeless Advisory committee met on Monday, August 21st. There were talks of the increases in Covid cases and how they are affecting the homeless population. The Health and Human Services department talked about providing homelessness resources on their website. The collection of data for the cost analysis of homelessness is in process. Committee members are also following up with tiny home communities throughout the state with Waco being the most recent example dedicated to housing.

#### Federal and State Legislative Update: Janie Metzinger, NTBHA

The observation was made that there is a significant increase of \$1.3 billion dollars compared with the previous biennium. This year's budget is set at \$9.3 billion dollars. There was also extensive discussion on the construction and remodel of local state hospitals and the costs associated with it. There will be additional hospitals constructed within the state that will allow more forensic beds to be available and accessed by law enforcement throughout the state.

#### RESOURCES

#### Shelter Discussions: Daniel Roby, Austin Street Shelter

Daniel Roby reported that Austin Street remains full every night with a low turnover rate of available beds due to the heat. This has caused some issues as they are trying to figure out how to accommodate the additional people and cover the costs associated with housing them. On average, they have about eight people per week moving out into permanent housing, but not currently due to the excessive heat. Even though there is an uptick in Covid cases, they are currently not seeing it amongst the residents while in the shelter. There has been an increase in job placements with some successful career fairs on the campus.

#### NTBHA: Eric McCarty, NTBHA

Eric McCarty reported that the TBRA program has not changed because no new funding is available in Dallas County and the waiting list is not open due to the lack of impact the program believes it will have. They anticipate some information regarding funding coming in October. In the cities that have funding, it has been difficult to find landlords willing to rent in those areas due to the short-term nature of the program.

#### Housing Navigator: Kimberly Rawls, Dallas County

Kimberly Rawls included the report in the packet and the FUSE partners are working to reconstruct the program with a new program model and budget. NTBHA has agreed to fund the Shelter Navigator positions with two other FUSE partners throughout the summer months with a possibility of extending it two years. There is also a possibility of another funding source becoming available and once the logistics are completed, that plan will be made available. The FUSE team was able to screen 4,084 individuals within a twelve-month annual span. The team is also working on the deliverables for the BJA to move forward with the procurement process for bidding. The Connector is running well on their end.

#### Homeless Jail Dashboard: Kimberly Rawls, Dallas County

Kimberly Rawls reported the jail data report is available in the packet on the back of the Housing Navigator report. With the increase to the total jail population, there was an increase across the board to the total homeless inmate numbers.

#### Housing Authority Report: Thomas Lewis, Dallas County HHS

Thomas Lewis was not available for the meeting, but submitted a report that is in the packet.

#### CARES Act/ARPA Funds: Commissioner Daniel, Dallas County

Commissioner Daniel reported that all ARPA funds have been allocated, but not yet spent. All avenues are being studied to make sure the funding is spent. The county is also looking at and working on a sustainability plan.

#### PROJECTS AND INDUSTRY UPDATES

#### Housing Forward updates: David Gruber, Housing Forward

David Gruber reported that their system performance metrics are showing strong numbers. Since 2020, they have had a 110% increase in housing placements. The average number of days a person is searching for housing is 86 days and 92% are remaining housed after six months of placement. Within twelve months, the average number of days people are searching for housing is 91 days and 99% of those remained housed. As of August 11<sup>th</sup>, Dallas Real-time Rapid Rehousing has housed 2,446 people. They have reformulated their goal to house 6,000 people by the end of 2025.

#### Pretrial Diversion and Mental Health Screening: Laura Edmonds, Dallas County

Laura Edmonds reported that Criminal Justice is continuing to work with jail releases and on average are releasing about 5 individuals per day to direct care and community services. They have started the expansion of the 1622 Code of Criminal Procedure Mental Health Assessment Process. In their fifth week, they are averaging about 80 assessments a day. They are experiencing some minor issues, but they are working them out as they go. They are also doing the first-time non-violent felony offender pre-trial diversion program assessments and are doing about 100 of those a month with some slight backlog. The department is remaining busy.

#### Dallas Connector: Daniel Roby, Austin Street

Daniel Roby reported that a meeting was scheduled for noon that day regarding updates for the Connector. They are currently discussing sustainability for the program as they are experiencing some slight financial issues to sustain the program. They have seen an increase in operation due to the inclement weather program and the Connector is being utilized around the clock and around the area. Through July, they have served 2,441 unduplicated passengers with a total of over 28,000 rides. There were an additional 572 inclement weather rides. Over 1,300 people accessed shelter beds utilizing this service. About 728 people were put into the Coordinated Access System (CAS), and 704 people were placed in housing on the road of the Connector.

#### Homeward Bound: Doug Denton, Homeward Bound

Doug Denton was unavailable for the meeting but provided a report located in the packet.

#### Youth Housing: Josh Cogan, A Way Home America

Josh Cogan was unavailable for the meeting and a report will be provided for the next meeting.

#### Family Housing: Ellen Magnis, Family Gateway

Ellen Magnis was unavailable for the meeting but, Commissioner Daniel reported that there still a need for the family housing and the need to address it. A report will be given at the next meeting.

#### Mattingly Report: Jim Mattingly, Lumacorp

Jim Mattingly was unavailable for the meeting, but he submitted changes to his report on the previous minutes. His updated quarterly report is also in the meeting packet.

The meeting was adjourned with words of motivation by staying engaged and informed by Dr. Daniel. Next Meeting: September 27, 2023














## **D.2.6—Community Mental Health Grant Programs**
