### **Dallas County Reports 106 New Positive 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) Cases and 2 Deaths, Including 10 Probable Cases**

**DALLAS** -- As of 12:00 pm June 21, 2021 Dallas County Health and Human Services is reporting 106 additional positive cases of 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Dallas County, 96 confirmed cases and 10 probable cases. There is a cumulative total of 262,274 confirmed cases (PCR test). There is a cumulative total of 43,232 probable cases (antigen test). A total of 4,111 Dallas County residents have lost their lives due to COVID-19 illness.

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) is providing initial vaccinations to those most at risk of exposure to COVID-19 and over 494,000 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered at the Fair Park mega-vaccine clinic, which started operations on Monday, January 11. According to the Texas Department of State Health Services, as of June 20, 71.45% of individuals 65 and older are fully vaccinated in Dallas County. The additional deaths being reported today include the following:

- A man in his 70's who was a resident of a long-term care facility in the City of Desoto. He expired in the facility and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A woman in her 80's who was a resident of a long-term care facility in the City of Dallas. She expired in the facility and had underlying high risk health conditions.

To date, a total of 137 cases with SARS-CoV-2 variants of concern have been identified in residents of Dallas County, including: 110 cases of variant B.1.1.7 (Alpha); six B.1.617.2 (Delta) variants; nine B.1.429 (Epsilon) variants; and twelve P.1 (Gamma) variants. Twelve have been hospitalized with 4 requiring intensive care unit admission, and two have died. One fully vaccinated patient subsequently became ill from B.1.1.7 infection and died. The provisional seven-day average of daily new confirmed and probable cases (by date of test collection) for CDC week 23 (week ending 6/12/21), was **84**, which is a rate of **3.2** daily new cases per 100,000 residents. Over the past 2 weeks, rates of new COVID-19 diagnoses in the cities of Balch Springs, Lancaster, Rowlett, Sachse and Seagoville have been about 50% higher than county-wide case rates. Rates of new COVID-19 diagnoses in the city of Cedar Hill have been about 30% higher than county-wide case rates.

As of the week ending 6/12/2021, about 56% of Dallas County residents age 12 years and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, including: 81% of residents age 65 years and older; 62% of residents between 40-64 years of age; 48% of residents 25-39 years of age; 36% of residents 18-24 years of age; and 20% of residents 12-17 years of age. In the cities of Coppell and Sunnyvale, greater than 80% of residents 18 years of age and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine (see below). About 91% of COVID-19 cases diagnosed in June were in Dallas County residents who were not fully vaccinated. In Dallas County, 700 cases of COVID-19 breakthrough COVID-19 infections in fully vaccinated individuals have been confirmed to date, of which 68 (10%) were hospitalized due to COVID-19, 28 have required ICU admission and 11 have died. During the months of April and May, 20% of all COVID-19 cases diagnosed in Dallas County were in children under the age of 18 years—the highest proportion in this age group since the beginning of the

pandemic. To date, 67 children have been hospitalized with diagnoses of multisystem inflammatory syndrome (MIS-C), a rare but serious complication associated with COVID-19 infection. Of symptomatic patients presenting to area hospitals in week 23 (week ending 6/12/21), **3.9%** of respiratory specimens tested positive SARS-CoV-2. In week 22, area hospital labs have continued to report elevated numbers and proportions of respiratory specimens that are positive for other respiratory viruses by molecular tests: parainfluenza (19%), rhinovirus/enterovirus (24%) and RSV (12%).

There are currently 11 active long-term care facility outbreaks. A cumulative total of 4,401 residents and 2,479 healthcare workers in long-term facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19. Of these, 1,122 have been hospitalized and 802 have died. About 20% of all deaths reported to date have been associated with long-term care facilities. Three outbreaks of COVID-19 in congregate-living facilities (e.g. homeless shelters, group homes, and halfway homes) have been reported in the past 30 days. A cumulative total of 638 residents and 224 staff members in congregate-living facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19. Local health experts use hospitalizations, ICU admissions, and ER visits as three of the key indicators as part of determining the COVID-19 Risk Level (color-coded risk) and corresponding guidelines for activities during our COVID-19 response. The most recent COVID-19 hospitalization data for Dallas County, as reported to the North Central Texas Trauma Regional Advisory Council, can be found at [www.dallascounty.org/covid-19](http://www.dallascounty.org/covid-19) under “Monitoring Data,” and is updated regularly. This data includes information on the total available ICU beds, suspected and confirmed COVID-19 ER visits in the last 24 hours, confirmed COVID-19 inpatients, and COVID-19 deaths by actual date of death. “Today we report a two-day total of 106 new COVID-19 cases and two additional deaths. The summer celebration is on now that the last of the area schools have now finished the school year. In order to have our

very best summer and to have a summer of freedom, more people need to get vaccinated as soon as possible. The President set a goal to have seventy percent of eligible people with at least one shot by July 4<sup>th</sup> and it does not appear that our country, state, or local area will reach this goal. Currently, only 56.68 percent of our eligible population in Dallas County has received at least one shot. There are many opportunities throughout Dallas County to get a shot. If you want to be a part of the experience at Fair Park, which proved to be one of the three most prolific and successful vaccination centers in all of America, take advantage before July 17<sup>th</sup> as the drive-thru site will be closing. Even after the site closes, there will continue to be county sponsored pop-ups and many locations open to get vaccine.

For those of us in the majority who have already received our vaccines, it's important that we do what we can to help our friends, loved ones, and those we have influence over get the information and confidence they need to get their shot. Every day I report deaths and every day around one hundred people are hospitalized in their fight with COVID. This now is a nearly preventable occurrence and we want everyone to take advantage of the free, life-saving vaccines," said Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends taking everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases, including:

- If you're unvaccinated, avoid close contact outside your home and put 6 feet of distance between yourself and people who don't live in your household.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others and continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.
- Stay home when you are sick, except to seek medical care
- Wash your hands often and with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and help young children to do the same. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-base hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces daily using a regular household cleaning spray or wipes.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash. If you do not have a tissue, use your sleeve, not your hands. Immediately wash your hands.
- Monitor your health daily. Be alert for symptoms. Take your temperature and follow CDC guidance if symptoms develop.
