# Dallas County Reports a Three-Day Total of 1,009 New Positive 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) Cases and 15 Deaths, Including 187 Probable Cases

**DALLAS** -- As of 12:00 pm December 07, 2021 Dallas County Health and Human Services is reporting 1,009 additional positive cases of 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Dallas County, 822 confirmed cases and 187 probable cases. There is a cumulative total of 351,664 confirmed cases (PCR test). There is a cumulative total of 65,032 probable cases (antigen test). A total of 5,295 Dallas County residents have lost their lives due to COVID-19 illness. Today's press release includes the new case totals accumulated from Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) provided more than 500,000 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine at the Fair Park mega-vaccine clinic, which operated January 11 through July 17. A vaccination clinic is open at the Dallas College Eastfield Campus Location on Tuesdays – Saturdays from 9am-6pm. A weekly popup vaccination clinic will take place at Fair Park on Sundays, from 10am – 4pm, starting November 21<sup>st</sup>, 2021.

The additional deaths being reported today include the following:

- A man in his 60's who was a resident of the City of Dallas. He was found deceased at home and had underlying high risk health conditions.

- A woman in her 60's who was a resident of the City of Carrollton. She had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A woman in her 70's who was a resident of the City of Farmers Branch. She had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 70's who was a resident of the City of Grand Prairie. He had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 70's who was a resident of the City of Grand Prairie. He had been hospitalized and had underlying high risk health conditions.

- An 80 year old woman who was a resident of the City of Dallas. She had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 80's who was a resident of the City of Dallas. He had been hospitalized and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 80's who was a resident of the City of Dallas. He was found deceased at home and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 90's who was a resident of a long-term care facility in the City of Dallas. He had been hospitalized and had underlying high risk health conditions.

To date, a total of 363 cases with SARS-CoV-2 variants of concern have been identified in residents of Dallas County, including: 151 cases of B.1.1.7 (Alpha) variants; four B.1.351 (Beta) variants; 180 B.1.617.2 (Delta) variants; and 21 P.1 (Gamma) variants. Twenty-eight have been hospitalized and five have died. Twenty-five individuals were considered fully vaccinated before infection with a COVID-19 variant of concern. One fully vaccinated individual was hospitalized. Three have been re-infected with a COVID-19 variant of concern. One fully vaccinated patient subsequently became ill from B.1.1.7 infection and died. As of 12/3/2021, a total of 1,258 confirmed and probable cases were reported in CDC week 47 (week ending 11/27/21), which is a weekly rate of 47.7 new cases per 100,000 residents.


As of the week ending 11/27/2021, about 75% of Dallas County residents age 12 years and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, including: 94% of residents age 65 years and older; 81% of residents between 40-64 years of age; 71% of residents 25-39 years of age; 60% of residents 18-24 years of age; and 56% of residents 12-17 years of age. In the cities of Addison, Coppell, Irving, and Sunnyvale, greater than 90% of residents 18 years of age and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine. In the cities of Farmers Branch, Garland, and Highland Park, greater than 80% of residents 18 years of age and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine. (See below).


About 72.5% of COVID-19 cases diagnosed in Week 47 were Dallas County residents who were not fully vaccinated. In Dallas County, 19,307 cases of COVID-19 breakthrough COVID-19 infections in fully vaccinated individuals have been confirmed to date, of which 736 (4.0%) were hospitalized and 177 have died due to COVID-19. Of all Dallas County residents tested for COVID-19 by PCR during the week ending 11/27/2021 (CDC week 47), **6.0%** of respiratory specimens tested positive for SARS-CoV-2. For week 47, area hospital labs have continued to report elevated numbers and proportions of respiratory specimens that are positive for other respiratory viruses by molecular tests: parainfluenza (6.1%), rhinovirus/enterovirus (31.2%) and RSV (7.4%).


There are currently 26 active long-term care facility outbreaks. A cumulative total of 4,867 residents and 2,884 healthcare workers in long-term facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19. Of these, 1,186 have been hospitalized and 846 have died. About 16% of all deaths reported to date have been associated with long-term care facilities. There have been 5 outbreaks of COVID-19 in a congregate-living facility (e.g. homeless shelters, group homes, and halfway homes) reported within the past 30 days. A cumulative total of 755 residents and 259 staff members in congregate-living facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19.

Local health experts use hospitalizations, ICU admissions, and ER visits as three of the key indicators as part of determining the COVID-19 Risk Level (color-coded risk) and corresponding guidelines for activities during our COVID-19 response. "The CDC has strengthened their recommendation regarding the use of testing. Testing is an important component of staying COVID safe. Essentially, they are recommending that before indoor gatherings, like family holiday parties, you take a rapid home test to know your status. A positive finding on the home test means virus has been detected in your body. A negative finding that means virus was not detected, but does not necessarily mean that you are COVID free. Testing whenever you have been exposed to a person who is COVID positive, or when feeling symptomatic is an important component of keeping your community safe and keeping down the spread of COVID. Self-test can be used as part of an overall risk reduction strategy that includes vaccination, getting your booster, masking, and physical distancing. You can self-test, even if you don't have symptoms or are fully vaccinated, in order to make decisions that will prevent spreading COVID-19

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends taking everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases, including:

- If you're unvaccinated, avoid close contact outside your home and put 6 feet of distance between yourself and people who don't live in your household.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others and continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.
- Stay home when you are sick, except to seek medical care
- Wash your hands often and with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and help young children to do the same. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-base hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces daily using a regular household cleaning spray or wipes.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash. If you do not have a tissue, use your sleeve, not your hands. Immediately wash your hands.
- Monitor your health daily. Be alert for symptoms. Take your temperature and follow CDC guidance if symptoms develop.
- CDC recommends that anyone with any signs or symptoms of COVID-19 get tested, regardless of vaccination status or prior infection.
- If you get tested because you have symptoms or were potentially exposed to the virus, you should stay away from others pending test results and follow the advice of your health care provider or a public health professional.
