Dallas County Reports a Total of 599 New Positive 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) Cases and 5 Deaths, Including 204 Probable Cases and 159 New Cases within 14 days of Specimen Collection Date

DALLAS -- As of 12:00 pm April 05, 2022 Dallas County Health and Human Services is reporting 599 additional positive cases of 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Dallas County, 395 confirmed cases and 204 probable cases. There is a cumulative total of 477,844 confirmed cases (PCR test). There is a cumulative total of 103,870 probable cases (antigen test). Today's report includes 159 newly reported cases of COVID-19 within 14 days of specimen collection date. A total of 6,300 Dallas County residents have lost their lives due to COVID-19 illness. Today's press release includes the new case totals accumulated from Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) provided more than 500,000 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine at the Fair Park mega-vaccine clinic, which operated January 11 through July 17. A vaccination clinic is open at the Dallas College Eastfield Campus Location on Saturdays from 9am-6pm. A weekly pop-up vaccination clinic will also take place at Ellis Davis Fieldhouse on Tuesdays through Saturdays from 10am-6pm.

The additional deaths being reported today include the following:

- A woman in her 30's who was a resident of the City of Grand Prairie. She had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 50's who was a resident of the City of Balch Springs. He had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 50's who was a resident of the City of Dallas. He expired in hospice and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A man in his 70's who was a resident of a long-term care facility in the City of Mesquite. He had been critically ill in an area hospital and had underlying high risk health conditions.
- A woman in her 100's who was a resident of a long-term care facility in the City of Irving. She expired at the facility and had underlying high risk health conditions.

To date, a total of 2,200 cases with SARS-CoV-2 variants have been identified and investigated in residents of Dallas County, including: 164 cases of B.1.1.7 (Alpha); 4 cases of B.1.351 (Beta); 1,687 cases of B.1.617.2 (Delta); 15 cases of B.1.427 (Epsilon); 22 cases of P.1 (Gamma); 9 cases of B.1.526 (Iota); 4 case of C.37 (Lambda); 3 cases of B.1.621 (Mu); 291 cases of B.1.1.529 (Omicron); and 1 case of P.2 (Zeta). Three hundred and seventy-four cases have been hospitalized and 51 have died. Thirty-six COVID-19 variant cases were reinfections. Six hundred and thirty-six people were considered fully vaccinated before infection with a COVID-19 variant.

As of 4/1/2022, a total of **356** confirmed and probable cases were reported in CDC week 12 (week ending 3/26/22), which is a weekly rate of **13.5** new cases per 100,000 residents.

As of the week ending 3/26/2022, about 81% of Dallas County residents age 12 years and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, including: 98% of residents age 65 years and older; 86% of residents between 40-64 years of age; 78% of residents 25-39 years of age; 67% of residents 18-24 years of age; and 62% of residents 12-17 years of age. In the cities of Addison, Coppell, Highland Park, Irving, and Sunnyvale, greater than 92% of residents 18 years of age and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine. In the cities of Cedar Hill, Desoto, Farmers Branch, Garland, Lancaster, and University Park, greater than 80% of residents 18 years of age and older have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

About 45.5% of COVID-19 cases diagnosed in Week 12 were Dallas County residents who were not fully vaccinated. In Dallas County, 43,722 cases of COVID-19 breakthrough COVID-19 infections in fully vaccinated individuals have been confirmed to date, of which 3,816 (8.7%) were hospitalized and 652 have died due to COVID-19.

Of all Dallas County residents tested for COVID-19 by PCR during the week ending 3/26/2022 (CDC week 12), **2.5%** of respiratory specimens tested positive for SARS-CoV-2. For week 12, area hospital labs have continued to report elevated numbers and proportions of respiratory specimens that are positive for other respiratory viruses by molecular tests: parainfluenza (4.98%), rhinovirus/enterovirus (32.07%) and RSV (3.06%).

There are currently 14 active long-term care facility outbreaks. A cumulative total of 6,444 residents and 4,362 healthcare workers in long-term facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19. Of these, 1,326 have been hospitalized and 901 have died. About 16% of all deaths reported to date have been associated with long-term care facilities.

There have been 0 outbreaks of COVID-19 in a congregate-living facility (e.g. homeless shelters, group homes, and halfway homes) reported within the past 30 days. A cumulative total of 1,028 residents and 424 staff members in congregate-living facilities in Dallas have been diagnosed with COVID-19.

Local health experts use hospitalizations, ICU admissions, and ER visits as three of the key indicators as part of determining the COVID-19 Risk Level (color-coded risk) and corresponding guidelines for activities during our COVID-19 response. The most recent COVID-19 hospitalization data for Dallas County, as reported to the North Central Texas Trauma Regional Advisory Council, can be found at www.dallascounty.org/covid-19 under “Monitoring Data,” and is updated regularly. This data includes information on the total available ICU beds, suspected and confirmed COVID-19 ER visits in the last 24 hours, confirmed COVID-19 inpatients, and COVID-19 deaths by actual date of death. “Community spread of COVID-19 in Dallas County remains low. However, it is still important that we take simple precautions like wearing a mask in crowded indoor spaces, particularly if we are immunocompromised, live with, or interact with people who have underlying conditions that could lead to complications by contracting COVID-19. Being up-to-date with the COVID-19 vaccine is also critical for protecting ourselves and our community from serious cases of COVID-19. There are many locations in Dallas County where you can receive any of the four doses of COVID-19 available to people who qualify, including the testing and vaccination site at Ellis Davis Field House, which is open Tuesdays through Saturday from 10am-6pm.
