DALLAS COUNTY, TEXAS Minutes of the Behavioral Health Leadership Team Meeting Thursday, June 12, 2025

Welcome and Call to Order

Commissioner John Wiley Price called the Behavioral Health Leadership Team (BHLT) meeting to order at 9:31 AM. Commissioner Price welcomed everyone and announced that the meeting was being recorded and those who continued in attendance were consenting to being recorded as a part of the open records.

The Commissioner present was Commissioner John Wiley Price. Commissioner Price entertained a motion for opening the meeting. A motion was made and seconded by another participant. The motion was unanimously passed by the committee members.

Review/Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the BHLT meeting held on Thursday, May 8, 2025, were included in the meeting packet. Commissioner Price offered an opportunity for the minutes to be reviewed and approved. The minutes were approved as submitted.

Introduction

Commissioner Price welcomed everyone to the meeting and asked first-time attendees to introduce themselves.

North Texas Behavioral Health Authority (NTBHA) Update

Carol Lucky, CEO, NTBHA, Ms. Lucky reported that NTBHA is in the process of securing contracts for the coming year; however, the budget has not yet been finalized. She noted that NTBHA continues to expand specialty programs and will begin participating in the Directed Payment Program (DPP) in September, which is expected to generate significant additional funding for outpatient mental health services. Ms. Lucky further reported that substance use disorder (SUD) funding for statewide services provided within the region will be transferred to NTBHA and Life Path in Plano. Commissioner Price briefly addressed the County's current interruption in accessing NTBHA information. Ms. Lucky stated that NTBHA is developing a workaround to restore access as quickly as possible and will collaborate with the Criminal Justice Department. Additionally, Ms. Lucky noted that recently awarded construction contracts will fund Metrocare's buildout of Supportive Housing, and NTBHA's buildout of a Crisis Services Center in collaboration with Austin Street Center. Ms. Lucky reported that NTBHA issued RFPs utilizing

Charity Care Pool Program funds to expand mental health services in the region with a potential of \$2.4 million in funding. Ms. Lucky reported, Youth180 has received \$151,295 to expand their mental health services, Homeward Bound was awarded \$636,077 to improve their Comprehensive Mental Health Program (CMHP) services, Nexus Recovery Cener was awarded \$475,408 for trauma informed mental health services, Life Enhancement Services awarded \$820,000 for direct clinical services, mobile mental health outreach and peer support services and Bridging The Gap was awarded \$410,000 for culturally competent mental health therapy services and a program for at risk children and adolescents. Finally, Ms. Lucky announced that her contract as NTBHAs CEO has been renewed for another four years.

Meadows Mental Health Policy Institution (MMHPI)

Ron Stretcher, Senior Director of Systems Management, MMHPI, reported that the Complex Care Work Group for the homeless recently held a productive feedback session to review progress and lessons learned. He noted that a follow-up meeting is scheduled for July 16, organized at the request of City Council Members Blackmon and Bazaldua, with Dr. Daniel invited to attend. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss how homeless individuals are being connected to mental health services and to address questions raised by constituents regarding available supports when encountering homeless individuals in their neighborhoods. Mr. Stretcher stated that the Complex Care Work Group is preparing a two- to three-page overview summarizing the session's findings and lessons learned, which will be shared with City Council members and this group once finalized.

Doug Denton, Executive Director, Homeward Bound, reported that the past month was another strong month, with 101 individuals served and no rejections. Regarding the Complex Needs Action Plan, an uptick in referrals was noted from the Central Division and DART Police, accounting for approximately 20 individuals. 27 individuals were brought in through the Rapid Response Program, following outreach efforts. Additionally, staff have begun tracking outcomes of interventions at convenience store locations, focusing on whether law enforcement would have otherwise been contacted. In May, feedback indicated that in 90 cases, store management or security would have called the police had staff not arrived to intervene. Mr. Denton raised concerns about potential funding cuts to their statewide HIV program, which serves individuals who are both HIV-positive and struggling with addiction. While no entity has directly addressed the status of the statewide HIV program, Ms. Lucky clarified that the matter is being considered in current funding proposals under negotiation with the State

Dallas County Behavioral Health Housing Workgroup (BHHWG)

No Update provided in this meeting.

Dallas County Mental Health Advisory Committee Update

Alma Lopez, Administrative Assistant, Criminal Justice Department provided the update. Ms. Lopez reported, for the month of May, there were 3161 magistrate orders for 16.22 screenings with 2,507 completed, 1,508 were face-to-face interviews, 272 were completed via telehealth. Ms. Lopez reported there were 225 individuals who refused screenings, 330 individuals unable to locate due to either being out of custody or not available during the multiple attempts to interview. The Mental Health Advisory Committee will continue to meet every three months on the 2nd Tuesday of the month, with the next meeting currently scheduled for Tuesday September 9, 2025, at 2pm.

Legislative Undate

Janie Metzinger, Director of External Affairs, NTBHA, provided an update and directed the committee to the report in the packet. She noted that this year's update is shorter than in previous sessions, as many bills did not pass. Ms. Metzinger provided highlights of key bills including; HB 305, HB 2035, SB 528, HB 5515 and SB 1164.

Funding Opportunities Updates

• SAMHSA Residential Treatment Grant Update

Marcus Turner, SAMHSA Program Manager, reported that SAMHSA had two admissions to Nexus Recovery, with an average wait time of six days. There are currently no admissions to Homeward Bound due to depleted funding. For the month of May, there were three successful discharges and one unsuccessful discharge, with the highest number of referrals coming from AIM Court.

• Community Courts Grant Update-Public Defender's Office (PD)

Paul Blocker, First Assistant, Public Defender's Office, provided an update on the mental health statistics within the packet. Mr. Blocker reported that the PD's Office has onboarded their new Community Outreach Coordinator, Mara Gillespie. Mr. Blocker, also reported on ongoing efforts to expand alternatives to incarceration for individuals with mental illness, highlighting lessons from Miami's successful diversion model and recent participation in Assisted Outpatient Treatment training in San Antonio. Mr. Blocker reported that Michaela Himes has been added as board of directors for the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) North Texas. Mr. Blocker also provided updates from the City of Dallas Drug Court and South Dallas Veterans Court, noting stable participation, recent graduations, and continued residential treatment placements. Additional mental health specialty court statistics are included in the meeting packet.

• Restorative Justice Division-District Attorney's Office (RJD)

Julie Turnbull, Chief of Restorative Justice Division, District Attorney's Office, directed the

committee to the stats in the report in the packet.

Upcoming Events and Notifications

• Dr. Walter Taylor, NTBHA, reported on the significant community impact of the Consumer Benefits team, noting that beyond service metrics, client testimonials highlight meaningful improvements in quality of life. Dr. Taylor shared stories that included clients gaining stable employment, improved financial stability, and enhanced emotional wellbeing, underscoring the value of these programs.

Adjournment

Commissioner Price thanked everyone for their collaboration and service. The meeting was adjourned at 10:28 a.m.

Mission Statement: The Dallas County Behavioral Health Housing Work Group (DCBHWG), with diverse representation, will formulate recommendations on the creation of housing and housing related support services designed to safely divert members of special populations in crisis away from frequent utilization of expensive and sometimes unnecessary inpatient stays, emergency department visits and incarceration.

Success will be measured in placement of consumers in housing and the decreased utilization of higher levels of care (hospitals and emergency care visits) and reduced incarceration in the Dallas County Jail. The DCBHWG is committed to a data driven decision-making process with a focus on data supported outcomes.

Dr. Daniel opened the meeting by having the members at the table to introduce themselves.

CALL TO ORDER: Commissioner and the committee approved the minutes from the May 23rd meeting.

RESOURCES

<u>Austin Street Shelter:</u> Daniel Roby, Austin Street Shelter

Daniel Roby reported that Austin Street maintains at full capacity for the month. For the month of May, the short term, limited program availability maintains at about 99% capacity and the shelter maintains between 98-99% occupied. They are averaging about 7-15 housing placements per week. Missing one week of data, they have about 30 housing placements for the month of May. The Connector project was averaging between 520 and 877 rides per week which equals out to about 2,500 rides for the month of May. They have also begun tracking housing exits and the pathways that neighbors are using to stay housed which includes placements such as long term treatment. Currently, they are averaging between 1-3 per week, but this tracking is new, and they will be monitoring data from now on. They are still turning away 2-3 times as many people as they are able to accept. They are averaging between 1 and 7 available limited capacity beds daily. Commissioner Daniel asked if they needed more beds to which Mr. Roby answered yes. They have the space for more beds, but they need the continued funding for them. He stated they recently added 100 new beds at no cost to the public, but they need continuous funding to support them. Commissioner Daniel asked what the cost is to support the beds and Daniel Roby answered around \$50 for total supportive costs. Doug Denton asked if their funding was HUD based, or COC funding and Mr. Roby stated that all shelter beds are funded philanthropically. He stated that they have some beds that are tied to the HSC funding, but only at an eighth of the cost of shelter expenses. Their HUD funding is for the continuum of care's rapid rehousing. He stated that through the Housing Forward's diversion program, they are able to help people who may not need shelter but need other things.

NTBHA: Eric McCarty, NTBHA

Eric McCarty reported that they have 18 million dollars funding in the general set aside. He also stated that he is working on applications he received in November of last year when the contracts were not renewed. They were renewed in April for three more years. So far, he has eight applications that are in process. Within Dallas County, clients are able to live in Addison, Carrollton, Richardson, and Desoto and they are also able to live in bordering counties. The TBRA funding isn't currently affected by the funding cuts but many of the clients are still not working their self-sufficiency plan and are coming back through the program. He stated that NTBHA has started a supportive employment program that helps clients find employment.

Housing Navigator/Homeless Dashboard/FUSE St. Jude: Kimberly Rawls, Dallas County Criminal Justice Kimberly Rawls reported that both the Housing Navigator and the Homeless Dashboard are in the packet. She stated that she is currently working on her annual FUSE report to see the data, recognize the current trends, and see the progress of the FUSE program. Mr. Rawls applied for the State Crisis Intervention Grant with the Texas Office of the Governor back in January 2025 and the state has requested additional information. They have submitted and are waiting for feedback. If awarded, it will fund the FUSE program. In the past, the awards have been granted as early as October and as late as

December, so they are waiting to see if they will receive funding.

In the Homeless report, there was a slight increase in the jail book ins from April to May which caused slight increases to the other categories.

Pre-Trial Diversion and Mental Health Screenings: Kimberly Rawls, Dallas County Criminal Justice

Kimberly Rawls reported that Laura Edmonds is out and that she will be giving the report for her today. They are continuing to schedule and facilitate releases from jail to connect them with the community and mental health services. ADAPT continues to complete mental health assessments for those who have been flagged with a suspected mental health need. In May, 2,507 assessments were completed. The Criminal Justice department is also working with Housing Forward on various attorney outreach and release planning for those flagged as complex needs neighbors to connect them with services. They have developed a warm handoff release program for those neighbors and are currently getting them connected to services.

There was a question about the capacity of the jail being full to which Commissioner Daniel answered that the jail is at 95% capacity. Kimberely stated that she spoke with LaShonda Jefferson, Asst. Director of the Criminal Justice Dept, about what the contributing factors are to the increase in population. Ms. Jefferson answered there are several contributing factors, including the overall jail book ins have increased and release rates have been slower. She also stated that transfers to state prisons have been slower due to staffing issues and parole is also experiencing staffing issues which attributes to more individuals being held. Some of the individuals in custody have un-filed cases which impact their bond amounts not being posted and there are pre-filed and pre-indicted statuses for clients that prevent them from being able to move forward in the system. The Criminal Justice department is working with attorneys to file writs for bond reviews for some of those cases.

There was a conversation regarding the Miami Model training and possibly having Mr. Lee Pierson come and present to the group on the current program the District Attorney's office has in place. Commissioner Daniel's staff stated they would follow up with Mr. Pierson.

Housing Authority: Thomas Lewis, Dallas County Housing Authority

Thomas Lewis reported that they are currently allocating the additional 100 Housing Choice Vouchers they received from Housing Forward. 28 individuals are now searching for housing. He stated that while the funding is available, they are working to get them housed quickly. Lisa Marshall asked if the Emergency Housing Vouchers were still available and Mr. Lewis answered that they granted those at one point but now they are no longer available. He reported that if a person wants to change to another type of voucher, they will need to reach out to HUD to try to transfer the voucher type. There was also a conversation regarding how Dallas County was able to receive the Housing Choice Vouchers from Housing Forward and if there is a specific metric that must be met to continue the relationship. Mr. Lewis explained that Dr. Huang and Housing Forward forged a relationship after Housing Forward received the grant to allocate vouchers allowing housing agencies to assist in the distribution. Dr. Huang made a commitment to Housing Forward to facilitate this particular voucher program through Dallas County's agency. Daniel Roby asked what is the HUD regulation that governs how the vouchers are used and Thomas Lewis responded that CFR 24.982 is the HUD policy that gives the guidelines on the use of the Housing Choice Vouchers.

MetroCare: Quincy Hogan, Metrocare

Quincy Hogan reported they are building 26 units at 9209 Elam Road behind the clinic property they recently purchased. This housing will support single parents with minor children, and they will hopefully begin applying for permits in November of this year. They are currently advertising a RFP for an attorney to sort out the specifics of the rental rates for the units. They have broken ground and poured the foundation for two single family homes in the South Dallas area for individuals with intellectual disabilities. There is a need for housing for those living with IDD with the current wait list for housing services being up to 15-18 years. They are looking to purchase another lot for another single family home but are having difficulty finding lots within the \$75,000 budget. These homes will be along the line of a group home style.

Housing Forward:

Representatives from Housing Forward were not available for the meeting, but Daniel Roby reported that they have a strong focus on their Street to Home Initiative. Kimberly Rawls echoed these remarks stating that Housing Forward has also reached out to the Criminal Justice department by sending them over a complex needs list of individuals in the downtown area to determine if they have been or are currently in the Dallas County jail system. This is an effort to reconnect them with Housing Forward once their release has been facilitated. Lisa Marshall stated that she attended their general assembly meeting, and they are also focusing on utilizing the rapid rehousing funding and asking the COC for legislative assistance regarding federal legislation.

PROJECTS AND INDUSTRY UPDATES

Homeward Bound: Doug Denton, Homeward Bound

Doug Denton reported that their psychiatric crisis residential program is staying fairly full with referrals from Parkland psych emergency rooms and others including Dallas Behavioral Health. They are also facilitating a significant number of walk-ins, of which the report reflects. The Deflection Center saw a record number of 101 intakes with DART Police and DPD bringing a number of people in. The average length of stay is 7 ½ days which is a slight increase from the previous month. They are working to release clients to the best possible situations. They were able to refer 8 clients to Austin Street Shelter and the Bridge. Mr. Denton stated that he believes their outreach engagement is working. They are engaging clients through substance abuse programs and providing those along with mental health services as well. If they find that the clients are engaged in services with another provider, they try to reconnect and re-engage the client back into services with that provider.

Family Housing: Family Gateway, Kendall Brown

Kendall Brown reported that they are going into their busy season with the summer months of June, July and August. There is an increase in the number of families that are experiencing homelessness. A number of factors contribute to this, including children being out of school for summer break. The data for the summer months will begin to come in and trends can then be analyzed. The shelter is due to replace damaged windows from the storm that occurred about a year ago. The City of Dallas is currently replacing those, and it will take about 6 months to complete that project.

Commissioner Daniel inquired about the Trump impact on organizations and Daniel Roby answered that their organization has lost \$100,000 which paid for food within their organization. They are currently having to rely on the private community to recover. Wendy Hardeman stated that the organizations such as AmeriCorps and AARP provide volunteers, and they are in jeopardy of losing their people. Doug Denton stated that they lost their AmeriCorps staff, their COVID technology grant funding, and their Alcohol Demonstration project that was out of HHSC. Kimberly Rawls stated that she was planning to apply for a lot of grant solicitations, but she was told they were removed due to DEI verbiage, and they have not been added back. Doug Denton also stated that the state has not renewed their funding for their addiction program for those living with HIV due to their program's zip code being in Dallas County, although they serve surrounding counties. He received a letter stating that because the program provides services in the same catchment area as NTBHA, their program should be receiving funding from the local behavioral health authority. NTBHA cannot fund this specific program due to it providing services outside of Dallas County. Traswell Livingston also stated that his connection to AmeriCorps has been severed and the staff that they were working with are gone.

ASD: Traswell, Livingston

Traswell Livingston reported that they do have a barrage of different funding, and their intakes are up year over year. They are up to 122 adults and 2 families over the first two quarters. Older black men are still the predominant applicants for intake. They are currently working on a 48-unit permanent supportive housing project at the old Braniff hotel on Wycliff and are targeting those who were formerly homeless, 55 years and older adults, living or not living with HIV for that new development. The project is scheduled to be completed in 2026, but extensive renovation is needed for the building. They also have another 74-unit permanent supportive housing apartment project on Meadow and I-75 in South Dallas. They are looking to provide for the needs of the community and have not earmarked a targeted population for that project. It is scheduled to be completed in the first quarter of 2026. These are tax credit developments, so they want to make rents affordable. They will also take any voucher or subsidy for the program.

Commissioner Daniel asked Mr. Derling Campos to provide information from his current role at Parkland. He stated that he is the Social work manager for the Biotel department in Parkland and they handle the medical guidance for Dallas County's EMS and firefighter teams. Within the department, they have a social work program that is currently contracted with cities to help run Dallas County's crisis correspondence teams for mental health. He currently staffs the crisis teams on the Southeastern Dallas Alliance CARE team, the Lancaster team, and potentially the Desoto CARES team in the future. He also has social workers that take mental health referrals and complex case referrals with the fire departments and EMS that contract with Biotel through Parkland. Biotel is a partnership with UT Southwestern and Parkland and they provide services through EMS. He stated that he can make connections to various departments within Parkland and other mental health and behavioral health resources for those in Dallas County focusing on cities outside the City of Dallas.

Commissioner Daniel thanked everyone for their work and encouraged them to continue to share information that they come across to share with the group .

89th Texas Legislature--Second Called Session



Bills Related to Behavioral Health

HOUSE BILLS

<u>HB 3</u>-King-Amends Texas Government Code 421-Homeland Security-Establishes a Texas Interoperability Grant Program for local governments including municipalities, counties, special districts, authorities or any other political subdivision of this state.

- Grants are for the purpose of acquiring interoperable emergency communications equipment for first responders.
- Requires a statewide strategic plan to govern interoperability of emergency communication equipment and infrastructure and network coordination.

Current Status: Passed House 8-21-25. Referred to Senate Select Committee on Disaster Preparedness and Flooding 8-22-25. Hearing on HB 3 set for 8-27-25 was cancelled with no further action, so HB 3 died. Note: SB 1-Perry-related to campground and youth camp safety passed both houses, but did not include a role for Local Behavioral Health or Mental Health Authorities.

<u>HB 16</u>-Leach (Companion: SB 17-Hughes)-Is an omnibus bill related to the operation and administration, practices and procedures of in Texas courts including youth diversion and court-ordered mental health services.

Amends Texas Government Code, Chapter 24, Subchapter C-District Courts

Section 1.13 creates the 503rd Judicial District in Rockwall County.

Section 1.14 creates the 504th Judicial District in Ellis County.

<u>Section 7.03</u> amends Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Chapter 102, Subchapter A to add Article 102.0061, regarding Fees in Expunction Proceedings to allow a fee to be waived after successful completion of a veterans treatment court program or a mental health court program.

<u>Article 11A-Court Ordered Mental Health Services</u>-Repeals Sections 8, 9, and 10 of <u>SB 1164</u> by Zaffirini, just passed in the 89th Legislature-Regular Session which were to go into effect on September 1, 2025.

- Section 8 of SB 1164-Amended Texas Health and Safety Codes 574.011 (a) and (b) to add lack of capacity language to the certificate of medical examination.
- Section 9 of SB 1164-Amended Texas Health and Safety Code 574.034(a) and (d) to add lack of insight language and likelihood of suffering or inflicting harm.
- Section 10 of SB 1164-Amended Texas Health and Safety Codes 574.035 (a) and (e) regarding the judge's options for court-ordered temporary inpatient mental health services, adds updated language.

Article 11B-Court-Ordered Mental Health Services-Amends SB 1164 by Zaffirini

Section 11B.01 amends Texas Health and Safety Code 574.011 (a) and (b).

- (a) A certificate of medical examination for mental illness must be sworn to, dated, and signed by the examining physician. The certificate must include:
 - (1) the name and address of the examining physician;
 - (2) the name and address of the person examined;
 - (3) the date and place of the examination;
 - (4) a brief diagnosis of the examined person's physical and mental condition;
 - (5) the period, if any during which the examined person has been under the care of the examining physician.
 - (6) an accurate description of the mental health treatment, if any, given by or administered under the direction of the examining physician; and
 - (7) the examining physician's opinion that:
 - (A) the examined person is a person with mental illness; and
 - (B) as a result of that illness the examined person is likely to cause serious harm to the person or to others or is:
 - (i) suffering severe and abnormal mental, emotional, or physical distress;
 - (ii) experiencing substantial mental or physical deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function independently, which is exhibited by the proposed patient's inability, except for reasons of indigence, to provide for the proposed patient's basic needs, including food, clothing, health or safety; and
 - (iii) not able to make a rational and informed decision as to whether to submit to treatment
- (b) The examining physician must specify in the certificate which criterion listed in Subsection (a) (7) (B) forms the basis for the physician's opinion.

Note: HB 16, Article 11B-Section 7 (A) (iii) repeals language related to:

(v) the patient evidencing an inability to recognize symptoms or appreciate the risks and benefits of treatment and ...

Section 7 (B) in the absence of inpatient mental health treatment, the examined person is likely to suffer serious risk of harm or to inflict serious harm on another person.



Section 11B.02 Repeals further sections of SB 1164.

Amends Texas Health and Safety Codes 574.034 (a) and (d).

- (a) The judge may order a proposed patient to receive court-ordered temporary inpatient mental health services only if the judge or jury finds, from clear and convincing evidence, that:
 - (1) the proposed patient is a person with mental illness; and
 - (2) as a result of that mental illness the proposed patient:
 - (A) is likely to cause serious harm to the proposed patient;
 - (B) is likely to cause serious harm to others; or
 - (C) is:
 - (i) is suffering severe and abnormal mental, emotional, or physical distress;
 - (ii) experiencing substantial mental or physical deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function independently, which is exhibited by the proposed patient's inability, except for reasons of indigence, to provide for the proposed patient's basic needs, including food, clothing, health, or safety; and
 - (iii) unable to make a rational and informed decision as to whether or not to submit to treatment.

<u>Note</u>: HB 16, Article 11B-Section 11B.02 (a) repeals language related to the proposed patient evidencing an inability to recognize symptoms or to appreciate the risks and benefits of treatment; and in the absence of court-ordered temporary inpatient mental health services, is likely to suffer serious risk of harm or to inflict serious harm on another person.

- (d) To be clear and convincing under Subsection (a) the evidence must include expert testimony and, unless waived, the evidence of a recent overt act or a continuing pattern of behavior that tends to confirm:
 - (1) the likelihood of serious harm to the proposed patient or others; or
 - (2) the proposed patient's distress and the deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function.

Section 11B.03 further amends SB 1164 by Zaffirini.

Amends Texas Health and Safety Code 574.035 (a) and (e).

- (a) the judge may order a proposed patient to receive court-ordered extended inpatient mental health services only if the jury, or the judge if the right to a jury is waived, finds, from clear and convincing evidence, that:
 - (1) the proposed patient is a person with mental illness;
 - (2) as a result of that mental illness the proposed patient:
 - (A) is likely to cause serious harm to the proposed patient;
 - (B) is likely to cause serious harm to others; or
 - (C) is:
 - (i) suffering severe and abnormal mental, emotional, or physical distress;
 - (ii) experiencing substantial physical deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function independently, which is exhibited by the proposed patient's inability, except for reasons of indigence, to provide for the proposed patient's basic needs, including food, clothing, health



or safety; and

(iii) unable to make a rational and informed decision as to whether or not to submit to treatment;

HB 16-Leach-continued

Section 11B.03-continued

- (3) the proposed patient's condition is expected to continue for more than 99 days; and
- (4) the proposed patient has received court-ordered inpatient mental health services under this subtitle or under Chapter 46B, Code of Criminal Procedure, for at least 60 consecutive days during the preceding 12 months.

<u>Note</u>: HB 16, Article 11B-Section 11B.03 (a) repeals language related to the proposed patient evidencing an inability to recognize symptoms or to appreciate the risks and benefits of treatment; and in the absence of court-ordered temporary inpatient mental health services, is likely to suffer serious risk of harm or to inflict serious harm on another person.

- (e) To be clear and convincing under Subsection (a), the evidence must include expert testimony and evidence of a recent overt act or a continuing pattern of behavior that tends to confirm:
 - (1) the likelihood of serious harm to the proposed patient or others; or
 - (2) the proposed patient's distress and the deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function

Note: HB 16, Article 11B-Section 11B.03 (e) repeals language related to the proposed patient's an inability to recognize symptoms or to appreciate the risks and benefits of treatment.

Current Status: HB 16 passed House by 130 Yeas, 1 Nay and 1 Present, Not Voting. HB 16 passed unanimously in the Senate and was sent to the Governor on August 28.

<u>HB 265</u>-Hull-Amends Texas Health and Safety Code 141 directing Texas Health and Human Services Commission to:

- Review youth camp rules.
- Require youth camp staff or volunteers to immediately report if the staff member or volunteer reasonably believes that a child's physical health, mental health or welfare has been adversely affected by abuse or neglect.
- Establishes an eleven-member advisory committee including a child psychologist.
- Requires youth camp staff and volunteers to undergo an annual criminal history record check and requires a check of the Texas Department of Public Safety sex offender database.

Current Status: HB 265 passed the House on August 29, and sent to Senate September 2. No further action before Senate adjourned *sine die* on September 3.



SENATE BILLS

SB 2-Perry-Amends Texas Government Code 418-Texas Disaster Act

<u>Subchapter M</u>-Authorizes Texas Department of Emergency Management to develop Emergency Manager Licenses at graduated levels (Bridge, Basic Intermediate, Advanced, and Master license levels.

<u>Subchapter N</u>-Establishes a Statewide Volunteer Management System.

- Defines "local government" to mean a municipality, county, special district or authority or any other political subdivision of this state".
- A "community organization active in disaster" is a nonprofit organization that regularly engages in disaster response and recovery operations and regularly prepares for those operations.

<u>Section 22</u> Amends the Texas Health and Safety Code to add a chapter on Mass Fatality Operations to include integration of mass fatality operations response teams with family assistance centers.

Current Status: Passed Senate August 18. Passed House with amendments August 21. Conference Committee failed to reach a consensus on SB 2 before adjournment *sine die* on September 3.
