Behavioral Health Steering Committee

Thursday November 20, 2014

Meeting called to order at 8:30am by Judge Wade.

Judge Kristin Wade requested approval for the October 16, 2014 meeting minutes. The meeting minutes were approved as presented with no amendments.

BHLT & CSP Update

Charlene Randolph, Policy Analyst for Dallas County Sept 369, over 250 goal. Transicare began with 33 discharged 2, ended with =37. Charlene announced that Stephanie Denton, Clinical Director for ACS, has left and introduced Ashley Rey as her replacement with ACS.

Jail Diversion

Pregnant Women in Jail

Shenna Oriabure reported there are currently 28 pregnant women in jail; 14 sentenced, 14 have upcoming court dates.

NorthSTAR Intakes

Duane Steele reported a 24% match rate for NorthSTAR intakes for the month of October with a total of 1484 book-ins with NorthSTAR matches.

SPN Reports

The Bridge

The Bridge report was presented in the package. Jay Meaders was not present.

<u>LifeNet</u>

Crystal Garland was not present; however Patti Scali was able to report her numbers MHJD 19, and ATLAS 3.

Metrocare

Sam McNair reported the following beginning and ending numbers for the month of October. Probation 95 (89), Parole 69 (59), Jail Diversion 24 (23), ATLAS 21 (21), STAC 15 (17), Wilmer 33 (38), FDU 40(39).

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ABC

Julianne Pyle reported the current census in: Atlas 4, MHJD 12, STAR 7, and OCR 4, for a total of 27 clients.

Value Options

Department of Health and Human Services recently completed an audit of Value Options; informally they have done very well. Daniel Byrd announced that Janice Jefferies has started as the new CSP Lead Clinician.

Problem Solving Courts

Probation

Serena McNair reported the following numbers for the Probation Department; ATLAS 26, DDC 21, MH 20, STAC 27 and STAR 18 for a total of 112.

DIVERT

Divert court report was presented in the package.

Mental Health

Patricia Scali, Mental Health Coordinator, reported combined felonies and misdemeanors there are 47 people in the outpatient competency restoration program. Additionally, for Misdemeanor Jail Diversion there were 17 people admitted bringing the number to 51 and 21 for the ATLAS Court.

Public Defender

Public Defender report was presented in the package.

Housing

Judge Mays asked how she should proceed with the clients she has currently in Salvation Army. Dr. Love reports that she has spoken with Blake Fetterman of the Salvation Army and clients are not being evicted from Salvation Army. There are currently additional meetings with Probation, and the Criminal Justice department taking place to discuss housing options and funding for clients in the specialty courts.

530 Sub Committee

Keta Dickerson reported in the 530 subcommittee reviewed and approved the FY 15 budget. The budget was not presented to the BHSC for approval. Ron Stretcher provided a history of the 530 funds and how they have been utilized. The funds must be utilized for participants in a Specialty Court. Currently the funds have mainly been utilized for treatment or transitional housing. Both Judge Wade and Mr. Stretcher spoke on the importance of the use of the fund, such as studies, trainings and staff that support the Specialty Courts through 530 funds.

Judge Wade asked for a motion on the approving the budget as it is presented. Ron Stretcher made a motion to approve the budget; it was seconded by Angie Byrd and a vote was cast. The ayes were the majority, therefore the motion was carried and budget was passed.

Announcements

Ron Stretcher, Director of Criminal Justice Department introduced new staff members: Brandy Coty has joined the department in the Competency Coordinator position, Nakish Greer has joined in the department in the Administrative Coordinator position.

Mr. Stretcher also announced that Patti Scali whose dedicated work with the county is resigning at the end of the year. Patti's retirement party is being held on December 10, 2014 at noon in Judge Wade's courtroom from noon to 2pm. Currently there is not replacement, in the interim Christina Gonzales, MH Specialty Court Coordinator and Brandy Coty, Competency Coordinator will fill in.

A consensus was reached to cancel the December 18th meeting for the BHSC. Any requests for funds will be presented to the sub-committee and approvals will go through a quorum.

 only DA submitted for TADCP.
- STAC TADCP Formal Request
 Christina Gonzales presented the formal request for Judge Mays and Judge Lewis to attend
 TADCP. Previously the 530 Sub-Committee approved a verbal request by Judge Mays to
 utilize 530 funds to attend TADCP for herself and Judge Lewis. The request was approved

MH Drug Testing Update

Keta Dickerson provided information from OOG-CJD, NADCP and SAMSHA on drug testing in specialty courts. During the operational tune up the NDCI staff reported they have no curriculum for mental health courts, they are aware they are in need to develop curriculum. Currently Dallas County operates under the guidelines of the NADCP Drug Court model. Information from the BJA, covers the 10 Essential Elements of Mental Health Courts, and states the court is responsible for having knowledge of the participant's substance abuse. The Dallas County Mental Health Court Programs Essential Characteristics mirrors Senate Bill 462. The statute does not require drug screening for Mental Health Courts, but it is looked upon as a best practice per BJA. Keta Dickerson stated although it is not in our statue it will be left up to the discretion of the respected ludge regarding their drug testing policy.

It was agreed to table the discussion of drug testing until guidance from NDCI and further clarification of how cite and release will affect Specialty Courts.

Specialty Courts

Judge Wade requested an email be sent out from the 530 Sub-Committee to Judges with Specialty Courts reporting a lack of 530 funds to attend NADCP. It was recommended that Judges utilize other resources such as their DDA, campaign funds or complete a briefing for Commissioners Court to obtain funding to attend NADCP. Keta Dickerson and Christina Gonzales will create the email for the judges relaying this information. The email will also provide information and dates for the first Quarterly Specialty Court Judge meeting, run by Keta Dickerson, Vonda Freeman, Serena McNair and Lynn Richardson will be on the first agenda. The meeting will take place once the new CSCD Director has started and ideally will be scheduled during lunch on a non-jury week.

Serena McNair will provide information on all the new judges and the specialty courts they will have at the BHSC on 01/15/2015.

Dr. Jill Johansson-Love made a request to switch the PRIDE Court and the DWI Court for the study, there was discussion regarding the switch; however, the matter was tabled.

















Specialty Court Treatment Program Progression Trend








DEC Specialty Court Participants by Gender
