Minutes of the Behavioral Health Steering Committee (BHSC) Meeting Thursday, April 17, 2025 Via Microsoft Teams

Call to order and Introductions

Judge Kristin Wade called the meeting to order at 8:30 am. 44 staff and agency representatives/providers attended, with names recorded via Microsoft Teams and email.

Minutes review and approval

The minutes from Thursday, January 16, 2025, meeting (packet pgs. 1-5) were reviewed with a motion and seconded by Harry Ingram and Jason Mills respectively, for acceptance with no discussion or corrections. The motion was unanimously passed, accepting the minutes as read without objection.

Presentation: Catholic Charities Dallas Senior Manager of Homelessness and Housing, James Espinosa, LMSW and Director of Homelessness, Health, and Special Initiatives, Sarah Masih, LCSW-S (ccdallas.org and https://www.ccdallas.org/services/st-jude-centers/)

Judge Kristin Wade introduced both James Espinosa and Sarah Masih and provided a brief overview of the history and purpose of the Behavioral Health Steering Committee (BHSC) and the 530 Sub-Committee.

James Espinosa and Sarah Masih presented from 8:40am to 9:10am with a Q&A session afterwards.

SAMHSA Update Marcus Turner, Jr. (pgs.6-7): Marcus Turner, Jr. reported that the data is on pages 6-7. He stated that Nexus admissions are up to 15 participants this year and the average wait time is 15 days. He reported that for Homeward Bound they have 17 admissions this year and the average wait time is 25 days. He shared that 17 individuals successfully completed treatment. He stated that through the SAMHSA grant funding he has experienced individuals begin the path toward sobriety, go through and complete treatment; and tremendously change their lives with help from both their vendors, Homeward Bound and Nexus. He thanked both vendors for their service working with the SAMHSA grant. He stated that on page 7 the graph reflects their highest performing referring courts. He reported that AIM Court leads with 13 referrals and both STAC and Competency courts are second with 9 referrals. He thanked all courts that refer into the SAMHSA grant for being great partners and the SAMHSA Coordinator, Regina Fowlks for her daily activity with the SAMHSA grant. He shared that Regina Fowlks has been doing an excellent job since joining the Dallas County

Criminal Justice Department and wanted to verbally give her acknowledgement and flowers. He stated from the SAMHSA grant funding they have reached their maximum contractual amount with Homeward Bound. He shared that it shows the amazing work that they are doing with Homeward Bound. He stated that it is good to demonstrate their work because when they receive funding from the federal government, they expect it to be spent. He stated that they appreciate Homeward Bound's work with the SAMHSA grant, but unfortunately, they have depleted their funding and exceeded their objectives. He also stated that they will segue shortly to provide more options regarding how to admit male participants into inpatient treatment. Lastly, he shared that Judge Kristin Wade stated there is another funding source opportunity that could be accessed to provide male inpatient treatment.

530 Sub Committee Marcus Turner, Jr. (pgs. 8-14): Marcus Turner, Jr. reported that the committee reviewed and researched the various departments and specialty courts and updated the voting representative roster. He reported that they had a voting item to determine the court size, which received numerous deliberations regarding what defines a small, medium, large, or specialty court. He shared that they concluded that there are three classifications for these courts. He shared that the first is the extra-large courts that include 150+ individuals, large courts include 100-149 participants, and anything under 100 participants are considered smaller courts. He stated that they plan to discuss bus passes and transportation. He congratulated everyone who received a scholarship to attend the Texas Association of Specialty Court Courts (TASC) conference and that they have received great reports about the conference. He reported that reimbursements will be released today to their Oracle Fusion accounts. He also shared that he would send an email confirmation once he disburses the reimbursement. Jail Reports

- <u>Jail Based Competency Restoration (JBCR) Laura Edmonds (pgs.15-16):</u> Kimberly Rawls reported that Laura Edmonds stated to please review the data in the meeting packet on pages 15-16.
- Hospital Movement Jeremy Lewis (pgs.17-18): Jeremy Lewis reported that for Mach 2025, they had 242 individuals on the hospital wait list, which is a decrease of 20 individuals from 2024. He reported that in March 2024, they had 19 people who were admitted into the state hospital. He stated that they had 12 removals due to either dismissal or in jail restoration. He also stated for March 2024, they received 131 evaluations, which is the highest they have received for a couple of years. Lastly, he reported on page 18 that the evaluations by the doctor remained the same as in previous months.
- <u>Outpatient Competency Jeremy Lewis (pgs.19):</u> Jeremy Lewis reported that the data is on page 19. He stated that they have 45 individuals in OCR, 8 belong to misdemeanor and 37 belong to felony.
- <u>FUSE and Homeless Reports Kimberly Rawls (pgs.20-24):</u> Kimberly Rawls reported that both the FUSE and Homeless reports are on pages 20-24. She stated that she is working on March 2025, FUSE data. She shared that she is also planning to create an annual FUSE report to see the different data trends throughout the operational years. She reported that she applied for the FY2025 State of Texas Office of the Governor's, State Crisis Intervention

grant funding to possibly help to fund the FUSE program in January 2025. She stated that they requested additional information, which she is working to provide and hopes to be rewarded. She reported for the homeless report that there was an overall increase in the monthly total jail bookin population from February 2025 to March 2025 of almost 500 people. She stated that because of that increase in the monthly total jail bookin population it caused an increase in the other categories. She reported that she is not sure what caused the increase. She shared as a theory that the increase may be due to the weather because of the recent thunderstorms in March 2025, but she does not know the exact reason for the increase. Lastly, she reported if anyone has any questions, please contact her at kimberly.rawls@dallascounty.org.

<u>Public Defenders Report Vickie Rice or Paul Blocker (pgs.25-27):</u> Michaela Himes reported that she has no new information to report and to please refer to the data in the meeting packet on pages 25-27. Judge Kristin Wade asked if she received either a new position or new title within their department. Michaela Himes answered and stated that she has been the Deputy Chief of the Special Programs division for a while. She also stated that they have recently absorbed their bond division and moved those attorneys to felony court dockets and has been directly supervising them. Lastly, she shared that even though she is the Deputy Divisional Chief and directly supervises their special problem-solving courts she still works with mental health cases while focusing on problem solving courts.

District Attorney's Report Julie Turnbull or Lee Pierson (pgs.28-39): Julie Turnbull reported that she does not have an update. Lee Pierson shared and congratulated Michaela Himes for being elected to the board of directors with National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). He shared that he is also part of the NAMI board of directors and looks forward to working with Michaela Himes. He reported that they have received grant funding to employ four new case managers and four new peer support specialists from Metrocare and thanked them for their support. He stated that they had filled most of those positions and thanked Jennifer Torres and her team for their help. He reported that they are working to find space for those newly hired individuals to work and that everything is going well, thus far. He shared that they have been very useful after nearly a month of being hired. He also introduced Kristy Lewis and Mychelette Thomas as being a part of the new personnel hires and Tanya Smallwood, is the Clinical Lead. Lastly, he thanked Metrocare for their partnership. Harry Ingram asked Lee Pierson what programs he anticipates the new personnel to support. Lee Pierson answered, stating that they are supporting their Pretrial Intervention (PTI) program for both felonies and misdemeanors. Lee Pierson also stated that they are helping complete private bar assessments.

Provider Reports and updates regarding in-person and videoconference services:

- The Bridge Kelly Kane (pg.40): Kelly Kane reported that she has no new information to report and to please refer to the data in the meeting packet on page 40. She also reported that she agrees with Kimberly Rawls' previous assessment regarding the weather, possibly causing an increase in unsheltered individuals getting arrested. Lastly, she reported that they are also experiencing a lack of available shelter beds in the community, which could contribute to the jail population increase.
- Metrocare Jason Mills or Jennifer Torres (pgs.41-43): Jason Mills reported that their numbers have been consistent. He reported that they had a decrease in participants from February 2025 and March 2025, at the Dual-Diagnosis Center (DDC) at Wilmer of about 10 people. He stated that it went from about 60 participants in January 2025 to 46 participants in February 2025 and 48 participants in March 2025. He stated that they are looking forward to more participants entering the program. He reported that the SAMHSA grant that they have with the Dual-Diagnosis Center

- (DDC) Aftercare Court is going well. He shared that they are ready for more participants, but that would involve them coming directly from DDC court. He shared that they have a counselor who is seeing participants and their caseworker who provides additional services. He also reported a challenge that they are experiencing, which is a recovery housing restriction. Lastly, he stated that the housing assistance that they have from the grant allows them only two valid options in Dallas, Texas to work with, which is limiting.
- IPS Reports Natalia Farr, Enrique Morris or Jessica Simmons (pgs.44-47): Jessica Simmons reported that their data is on pages 44-47. She reported that their intakes have slightly increased from the previous period. She stated that they are running a week out for their Specialty Court intakes. She reported that if anyone needs to get their participants into mental health or substance abuse treatment to please contact their assigned Program Coordinator for their court. She reported that if their court has not been assigned a Program Coordinator, please email referrals to connect@ipsrecovery.com. Judge Kristin Wade asked if they have any transportation resources or any recommendations as to where participants can park cheaper, so it does not create a barrier for their attendance. Jessica Simmons answered, stating that she suggested participants taking public transportation since the bus lines are within walking distance from their agency. She stated that way, participants can walk a couple of blocks to reach their agency rather than paying for parking. She reported that about 60% of their groups participate in telehealth services, which is usually not an option for many of the Specialty Court participants. She also stated that she could ask a member of their communications team to research various parking lots near their agency, receive the parking costs, and she will keep everyone posted. Lastly, she shared if anyone knows of any transportation reimbursement funding options to please email her at: jsimmons@ipsrecovery.com.
- Homeward Bound Doug Denton (Verbal report): No verbal report provided.
- Nexus Stacy Burns (Verbal report): Stacy Burns stated they are down 20 beds in their adult
 women program due to demolishing the building. She reported that they plan to open their
 new building near the end of May 2025, which will expand their detox beds to 16 and then
 open some of the adult detox beds.

Problem Solving Courts

• <u>DIVERT Trina Crosby (pg.48):</u> Trina Crosby reported that they have been receiving higher risk and need referrals. She also shared that they are preparing for National Treatment Court month, and they are planning to partner with the Association of Persons Affected by Addiction (APAA) to host a movie event in May 2025.

Specialty Courts

• CSCD Jocelyn Esquivel, Serena McNair or Dr. Marta Kang (Verbal Report): Jocelyn Esquivel introduced herself as the new Specialty Courts Supervisor. She reported that for STAC, in January 2025, they began the month with 68 participants and ended with 57 participants. She reported that in February 2025, STAC began the month with 57 participants and ended with 64 participants and for March 2025, began with 64 participants and ended with 12 participants. She stated ATLAS court in January 2025, began the month with 12 participants and ended with 11 participants. She reported that in February 2025, ATLAS began with 11 participants and ended with 12 participants and for March 2025, they began and ended with 11 participants. She reported for STAR court, in January 2025-March 2025, they began and ended with five (5) participants. She also shared that their goal is to continue to enroll people into the program and help them successfully graduate. Lastly, she

stated that she will provide documented data to include in the meeting packet for the next scheduled BHSC meeting. Judge Kristin Wade asked Jocelyn Esquivel to clarify her title. Jocelyn Esquivel answered, stating that she is one of the Specialty Court Supervisors and manages ATLAS, STAC, and STAR courts.

Announcements


- > Janine Metzinger reported that both the House and Senate passed their budgets and neither agreed and are currently in conference. She stated that there were no representatives from Dallas County or any of the six (6) county areas were part of the conference committee. She reported that there were funding cuts to the mental health budget line item and for this session the legislative budget board combined all the Community based mental health budget line items. She reported that there were previously three (3) separate budget line items, which included: Adult Mental Health, Children's Mental Health, and Crisis. She stated that the budget cuts that she saw in the original proposed budgets for those line items were due to the expiration of the additional federal money that came down with COVID and the post COVID inflation reduction act. She reported for the legislative sessions it seems that there have been fewer mental health bills that have been filed. She shared that it could be due to the department of Health and Human Services (HHS) undergoing a "sunset" or "shifting" of priorities, which some members maybe waiting to see what that sunset cushion will be for HHS and behavioral health. She reported that some of the changes that have been proposed include emergency detention and jail-based competency that were in the April 10, 2025, BHLT meeting packet. She also reported if anyone has any questions about any of the bills to email her at imetzinger@ntbha.org. Lastly, she stated that there were also bills pertaining to boarding homes that reached the last hearing. She shared that one bill was presented yesterday and the other on either Monday, April 14, 2025, or Tuesday, April 15, 2025, which she will keep everyone posted with the outcome.
- ➤ Barbara West announced that STAC will host a graduation scheduled for Friday, May 16, 2025, in the Central Jury room at the Frank Crowley Courthouse.
- Judge Kristin Wade stressed the importance of everyone attending the BHSC and various committee meetings to work together and research resources and share any funding information in lieu of the governmental budget cuts.
- Judge Kristin Wade announced that the next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, July 17, 2025, @ 8:30 am. 

Review/Approval of Minutes

The meeting was called to order by Deborah Hill at 9:01 AM. The meeting minutes from the February 12, 2025, meeting were reviewed. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Bryan Smith. Harry Ingram seconded the motion. The minutes were approved.

530 Fund Balance & Update

The current total balance is \$257,103.31. There are 370 bus passes available. Funds have been utilized for training, incentives, inpatient treatment, transitional housing, and drug testing. The operating total invoiced amount is \$43,424.74, and the current remaining balance is \$141,575.26. The incentives breakdown and all financial information can be found in the 530 Fund Sub-Committee meeting packet. The General Account 120 currently has a balance of \$22,102.58. The Specialty Court Survey that is required to be submitted to receive funds for incentives can be found in the packet.

Drug Testing

Deborah Hill reported that the current balance available for Drug Testing is \$36,110.00. The total line-item budgeted amount was \$44,400.00 of which \$8,290.00 has been invoiced.

Inpatient Treatment & Transitional Housing

The line-item budget for Inpatient Treatment at Salvation Army was \$34,000.00. The amount currently available for this line item is \$26,980.00. Deborah Hill reported that the total amount of transitional housing invoiced is \$7,020.00. The funds available for Transitional Housing are \$16,107.00

Voting Items

Deborah Hill opened the floor to discuss the logistics of court size determination regarding the amount of court team members, court capacity, or a combination of both. Serena McNair stated that in the past, court size was determined by the capacity of participants in the court. The court size was used to determine the allocation of incentives and drug testing for each court. Julie Turnbull mentioned that courts that have a growing number of participants require the court to increase their court staff. She requested that the committee consider using a combination of court capacity and court team members in determining court size and the utilization of state stipends. It was determined that there should be extra-large (150+ participants), large (100 - 149 court participants), and small court size (under 100). Charlene Randolph suggested that the

committee utilize the capacity that is recorded with the Office of the Governor (OOG) for each. If the capacity is changed with the OOG, the court must notify CJD to have the capacity updated on the 530 Specialty Court Roster. Michaela Himes made a motion that the committee vote that the determination of court size be determined by court capacity in which there will be 3 sizes: extra-large (150+ participants), large (149 – 100 participants), and small (under 100 participants), and Julie Turnbull seconded the motion. Review/Approval of Minutes

The meeting was called to order by Deborah Hill at 9:01 AM. Presentations from Parkland Correctional Health Impactful MAT Programs and Life Enhancement Services were presented to the committee. The meeting minutes from the March 12, 2025 meeting were reviewed. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Judge Kristin Wade. Michaela Himes seconded the motion. The minutes were approved and accepted.

530 Fund Balance & Update

The current total balance for the 530 fund is \$242,533.17. There are 310 bus passes available. The FY25 Account Credits balance is \$60,624.84, and the current operating remaining balance is \$119,708.38. Deborah Hill reported that the remaining balance for specialty court incentives is \$20,350.00. Serena McNair mentioned that she is in the process of contacting the remaining courts who have not completed the survey required to be eligible to receive funds for incentives. The balance available in Account 120 is \$27,088.39.

Drug Testing

Deborah Hill reported that the current balance available for Drug Testing is \$34,923.85. The total line-item budgeted amount was \$44,400.00 of which \$9,476.15 has been invoiced.

Inpatient Treatment & Transitional Housing

The line-item budget for Inpatient Treatment at Salvation Army was \$34,000.00. The amount currently available for this line item is \$22,552.00. The current funds available for Transitional Housing are \$13,269.00.

TASC Update & Take Aways

Kim Duran announced that AIM court won second place in the Video Contest during the conference. Deborah Hill mentioned that reimbursements for the TASC conference are actively being submitted. A briefing request is being resubmitted to be included in the April 15, 2025 Commissioner's Court Agenda. The additional briefing will include the airfare expenses for the TASC conference.

Bus Pass Distribution

Deborah Hill stated that there are currently 310 bus passes available to utilize for the remainder of the fiscal year. Ms. Hill proposed that funds be transferred from the drug testing line-item to purchase additional bus passes. Judge Kristin Wade mentioned that additional funds are needed to purchase bus passes as the MHJD and SET courts rely heavily on providing passes to indigent and homeless participants, which assist with ensuring that they remain compliant. Ms. Barbara West stated that STAC court also struggles with keeping a supply of bus passes for their homeless clients. She mentioned that many of their clients rely on the passes to provide transportation to attend court.

It was determined that historically there was not a set policy regarding the distribution of bus passes and may have been distributed to the courts according to court capacity. Deborah Hill mentioned that a policy for the distribution of bus passes will be implemented to allow standardization. The amount of funds to be transferred will be discussed at the next 530 Sub-Committee meeting.







Patient Intake Trend




Program Utilization Distribution





Patient Ethnic Distribution




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
