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# **DCHHS Promotes National Preparedness Month**

DCHHS will collaborate with the City of Dallas and the Department of State Health Services Region 2/3 in an Emergency Preparedness and Health Fair event. This event will be conducted at the West Dallas Multipurpose Center and will have free flu shots, food, fun, prizes and music along with preparedness information, vendors and community agencies.

## DCHHS Now Offers Flu Vaccine for Adults

Influenza season is quickly approaching and Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) is now offering the seasonal flu vaccine for adults. Residents can get the flu shot at any one of the seven DCHHS clinic locations throughout Dallas County. Locations may be found at the following link; http://www.dallascounty.

The cost for the flu vaccine is \$20. Flu vaccine is covered by Medicare and Medicaid at no charge. DCHHS anticipates offering the Texas Vaccines for Children Flu vaccines mid-September.

"We urge everyone to get their flu shot now while it is early in the season," said Ganesh Shivaramaiyer, DCHHS director. "The sooner you get the flu shot and practice good hygiene the severity of the flu season, most certainly, could be averted".

DCHHS is following guidelines from the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention (CDC) to begin offering the flu vaccine as soon as it becomes available in the community. CDC recommends the flu vaccine as the best means of flu prevention for almost everyone except children

> younger than 6 months of age. The flu vaccine DCHHS provides is an all-in-one shot that protects against multiple flu strains including the H1N1 virus.

"It takes about two weeks for the body to develop the antibodies needed to provide protection against the flu virus," Dr. Perkins "That's why we are encouraging everyone to get the flu vaccine as soon as possible, so they're protected early in the flu

season."

In addition to getting the flu shot, DCHHS encourages everyone to practice cough and sneeze etiquette along with proper hand-washing. DCHHS has flu prevention materials on its website available for the public to download.

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### **DCHHS Successfully Mobilized BTS Vaccination Clinics**

From July through August DCHHS vaccinated." said Interim Director Mobile Back-to-School initiated vaccination clinics. With this initiative. DCHHS worked with community partners in order to get the word out to the public. "You can give a kid a haircut and brand new school supplies but if he/she gets sent home on the first day of school because their shots are not up to date; you have set that child up to fail." said Dallas Police Department Officer Bervin Smith. "It sends the wrong message to the child.", he continued to say. Interim Director Ganesh Shivaramaiyer expressed his sincere gratitude for this collaborative effort with the DPD especially with these events that provided free school supplies to the children that received vaccines. "The initiative helped us mobilize to various areas in Dallas County to allow families to overcome barriers that would prevent them from getting their children



### Dallas Foundation Provides Additional Funding for Emergency Air-conditioner Program

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) has secured funding in the generous amount of \$19,700 from Emergency Heat Relief Fund of The Dallas Foundation on August 28, 2018. The funds will be used for the purpose of purchasing and installing air conditioner

units to those homes that do not have a functional air conditioner unit. Priority will be given to those households with presence of vulnerable individuals such as children aged 5 years and younger, disabled persons, and/or elderly individuals.

Dr. Gary Woo discussed two confirmed case of Tuberculosis at W. T. White High School. These cases were confirmed just before the 2018-19 school year officially commenced. "You just need to be exposed for prolong periods of time to air that the source case has been breathing or coughing." He urged parents that if their children were exposed to this infection to be tested. Symptoms of TB include: coughing-up of blood, fatigue, fever, weight loss, decrease in appetite and sometimes night sweats.

While parents are busy getting their children ready to go back to school this fall, vaccines should be on the list too. Interim Director Ganesh Shivaramaiyer encouraged parents to make sure their children's immunization records are up to date before school begins. "There are 16 vaccine preventable diseases. These diseases can be serious and can lead to hospitalization as well as death, especially for infants and

children." he said. Parents who have children from birth through 18 years old are urged to get their children the required vaccines before school begins. DCHHS has 7 immunization

#### DCHHS Presents at Commissioner Daniel's Town Hall Meetings

DCHHS was invited to speak about West Nile Virus at Commissioner Theresa Daniel's Town Hall Meetings. The town hall meetings took place at Road & Bridge 1, Northwest Community Center and Eastfield College in Pleasant Grove. With the emphasis on the 4D's of prevention–Interim Director, Ganesh Shivaramaiyer also talked about DCHHS' continuous efforts to trap mosquitos, test mosquito pools and treat in areas where positive traps were identified. DCHHS provided mosquito repellent and dunks to the participants of the town hall meetings. Other topics that were presented at the town hall meetings: Parkland-Victim Intervention Program, Dallas Independent School District, Dallas County Tax Office, Dallas County Mental Health Courts, Dallas County Public Works & Trails.
